It will be necessary to raise this amount among the students, entirely apart from all outside assistance, in order to carry on the work of the "Y" for the present year. One girl from each living organization on the campus will handle the collection of subscriptions in her group, and it is hoped to have as many of these donations as possible in cash. For those who find it impossible to pay in eash, time pledges will be given.

The budget of the association for the present year includes proportional support of national and foreign student secretaries, the upkeep of the bungalow, social expenses and contributions to the general religious undertakings of the organization. The association at Oregon, together with the Y. W. associations in the colleges and universities of Washington, Idaho and Montana, art at present supporting a Y. W. worker in Japan, who is engaged in educational and field work connected with the association. This expense is also included in the year's budget.

A similar drive will be made under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. for \$1200, to be raised among the men of the campus. Webster Ruble is in charge of the campaign. The plan of soliciting is practically the same as that of the women, and the drive will take place during the same time.




