The University R. O. T. The band will meet at the corner of thirteenth and Alder a few minutes before the cadets form, and will play a selecton or two to arouse pep for the occasion.

Since it is desired that the cadets make the best showing possible, Colonel Sinclair, commandant, has requested that all men wear wrap leggins, and appear in full uniform.

The battalion will be led by the regular commissioned and non-commissioned officers, and Don Zimmerman, student colonel, who will be accompanied by his staff. The band will come next in line, with companies A,

B, C, D, marching in the order named. In the afternoon the military department will participate in the flagraising exercises, which will be augmented by the firing of the 75 millimeter gun imported from O. A. C.
