Alumni Interest Needed

The alumni want greater representation on the executive council. If acceding to their request would stimulate their interest in the University, the change should be made.

Since there has been but one representative of the alumni on the council there has been a noticeable lessening of interest among the graduates. They have felt, and rightly so, that they have not been consulted about the University's affairs. They have felt that their advice and interest was not wanted; that the students wanted to control everything.

The University must not allow the interest of the alumni to die. The old students are the staunchest friends of any college, and it is unfortunate if any have been led to believe that the University did not care for their advice. Oregon needs alumni advice and support and should feel that the request is but an indication of the never-failing interest of an alumnus in his alma mater.

Colleges everywhere depend upon their alumni for backing their athletic policies. They give them a hand in forming these policies. But it is hard to ask our alumni to support our athletics unless they know something of them. They will help to secure good material each fall if they are asked to do it. In a number of the colleges the alumni have the majority on the athletic board of control. Here they have one vote out of eleven.

There are a number of things which should be changed, and the action of the student council is to be commended. It is not surprising that there are unsatisfactory provisions in the constitution. All of the proposed changes should be included and brought up for the vote of the students at the same time.

Keep Monday Nights Free

Something must be done to prevent encroachment on the Monday night hour reserved for house meetings at the various living organizations. It has been so hard to find time to schedule meetings and rehearsals that one of the organizations and professors have required their groups to miss house meetings.

Monday nights are traditionally free from any other meetings and should be kept so. Organizations have the first right on their members that night, and if other meetings or practices are scheduled those who are absent should be excused.

Fighting Against Odds

Tonight Oregon meets the Aggies! The Lemon-yellow may be definitely out of the running for the championship, but a game with O. A. C. is always interesting. The Oregon players will make a desperate effort to redeem themselves. They will try harder than they have tried all season. FIRST WEEK WINNERS IN DO-NUT SWIM NAMED

Susan Campbell, Hendricks, Alpha Phi and Theta Run up Highest Scores in Aquatic Meets

Susan Campbell, Hendricks hall, Alpha Phi and Theta were winners in the first four do-nut swimming meets run off this week. Susan Campbell, in a meet with Delta Zeta scored 51 points against her opponents 20. Maude Schroeder was high point swimmer for Susan Campbell, with 15 points to her credit. Gertrude Houck made 8 of the twenty points scored by Delta Zeta. Hendricks hall swimmers outswam the Pi Phi running up the score of 51 to 25 against the latter. Anna DeWitt of Hendricks hall with 12 points to her credit scored the highest number of any swimmer in this meet, but Janet Wood, of the Pi Phi team was a close second with ten points. Alpha Phi won from Delta Zeta yesterday by a high score of 43 to 23. Winifred Hopson, Helen Atkinson of the winning team tied with Gertrude Houck, Delta Zeta, for honors, each earning 13 points. The Theta-Tri Delt meet resulted in the score of 51 to 19, the former easily outswimming their opponents. Star Norton, making 15 points for the winning team, was the high point swimmer of the meet. Betty Garrett won second place with 11 points and Marguerite McCabe claimed 9 of the points made by the Tri Delt team. Today Susan Campbell will swim against the Theta team at 5 o'clock.

DEAN ROBBINS SPEAKS ON STATE'S PROGRESS

Geographical Divisions of Oregon Make Small Communities, Is Belief of Head of School

Dean Robbins of the school of business administration spoke before the Eugene Chamber of Commerce this noon on why Oregon has not progressed faster as a state. The chief reason is the geographical condition of the state, believes Dean Robbins. The state is divided up into many small units, coast territory, Rogue River valley, Willamette valley, eastern and central Oregon. Each of these communities has tended to act as a separate unit, uninterested in the state as a whole. This makes for provincialism, says Dean Robbins.

The Portland Chamber of Commerce has outlined an extensive program of statewide development. It is now raising among the business men of Portland \$300,000 to be used outside of that city. Three features of this plan are: publicity, land settlement, and, most important, cooperative marketing.

WOODS WITH FOREST SERVICE

Forest ranging and work in the botany department of the University of Oregon extension division form the occupations of R. S. Woods, of the United States department of agriculture, in the forest service at Gurdane in Umatilla county. Mr. Woods writes that he has been reading snow stakes for some time but that he intends to resume his work in the course in botany which he started last spring. He has sent a request for specimens and expects that this work will help him in his ranging.

Tea in Honor of Occasion Is Slated for Today; Foreign Students Asked to Be Guests

The Daughters of the American Revolution, Lewis and Clark chapter of Eugene, in celebration of International Day are to give a tea this afternoon in the Woman's building at which the foreign students of the campus will be guests. The price is such that no one need worry, for both crackers and milk can be obtained for ten cents. The sale begins today and will continue indefinitely under the direction of Elizabeth Griggs.
