

WOMEN WILL HOLD FIELD DAY JUNE 2

Many Events Scheduled for Annual Affair; Cups and Awards to be Given

Annual field day, to be held Saturday, June 2, will wind up the program of sports of the Women's Athletic association for this year. The events scheduled for the day include volley and baseball games, tennis matches, canoe races, archery shoots, and track meet.

Starting at 9 o'clock, finals in the interclass canoe races will be run off. Classes participating will be announced later. The championship baseball game, which will be played off between the sophomore and senior classes, is slated to come off at 9:45. Both sophomore and senior teams won easy victories over the O. A. C. players here last Saturday and have maintained leads in the interclass series this season. At 11 o'clock, the interclass championship volley game will be played, but due to close competition the winning teams have not yet been chosen to compete. The interclass archery shoot, which is scheduled for 1:30, will be followed by a track meet on Hayward field at which time events, which will be stressed next year, will be demonstrated, but not especially for interclass competition. This meet will be the first outdoor meet which women have participated in at the University of Oregon. The list of events is as follows: Track, 25, 50, 75 yard dashes, hurdles, 65 yards, walking, relay and three-legged races, throwing events; javelin, basketball, baseball, jumping events; standing broad jump, running broad jump, high jump, and hop, step, jump.

The championship class tennis matches will be played off at 3 o'clock on the new courts and following these at 4:15, the presentation of cups to winning teams will take place in the quadrangle between the women's dormitories.

Florence Jagger, president of the Women's Athletic association, will make the awards. Announcement of the all-star baseball team will also be made. This team, picked by Miss Waterman, of the physical education department, and the various heads of sports, is an honorary varsity team. The names of girls who have earned 1000 points for sweaters and those earning 500 points for small letters will be announced.

Lomax Praised Sigma Pi Tau for Record in Scholarship; Organization Has High Ideals

The Inter-fraternity council unanimously accepted the petition of Sigma Pi Tau, men's local fraternity into the council at a recent meeting.

In speaking of the record of Sigma Pi Tau, A. L. Lomax, professor in Foreign Trade, and president of the Inter-fraternity council said, "They are a very good bunch of men with high scholarship." Professor Lomax hopes that in the future fraternities on the campus will take a greater interest in scholarship. He does not mean to belittle athletics in the least but wants to see the two combined. "We are realizing," said Professor Lomax, "that it is not the men with the biggest muscles that make the best record." It is his belief fraternities on the Oregon campus are now beginning to think more of scholarship than in the past.

It is not compulsory for new fraternities to petition for admittance into the inter-fraternity council but it is usually done because of the cooperation to be obtained from other fraternities and the council.

Phi Beta Kappa Will Take Alumni into Membership at same time with Undergraduate Group

Several graduates will return to be initiated with the 23 undergraduates on June 4, when the Oregon chapter of Phi Beta Kappa holds its first initiation for undergraduates since the chapter was installed on the campus April 14. The following graduates are expected to appear at this time: Arthur Bramley, '22, a major in Physics, who has been doing graduate work at Princeton this year; Mrs. Olga Soderstrom Young, '18, of Portland; Miss Alice Lighter, '22, who is now teaching in the Grants Pass high school, and Professor W. M. Atwood, of Corvallis, who will be initiated by the Oregon chapter for the chapter at Cornell, Iowa, where he received his degree. All graduate members of Phi Beta Kappa have been invited to attend the initiation.

The program has been arranged to take place in the Woman's building, commencing at 5:20, when all undergraduates will assemble in the League room at 5:30. At 6:00, a banquet will be held in the dining room, adjoining the sun parlor. At 8:15, a Phi Beta Kappa public address will be given by Dr. Edward O. Sisson of Reed College. His subject is to be "The Relation of Evolution to Morals and Religion."

R. Justin Miller, professor of law, will act as toastmaster at the banquet. Responses will be made by Professor Frederick S. Dunn and Professor F. L. Stetson, for the faculty. Emily Veazie for the undergraduates, Ralph Hoerber for Alumni and S. D. Allen for the town members.

JOURNALISTS TO RIVAL FOR BEND "SCOOPS"

He expects to supply for members of the office force who will be taking vacations and does not know definitely what his duties will be. "However the Press expects to scoop the Bulletin on all days of publication," he added with a smile. Brogan says he, too, is looking forward to a little friendly rivalry "in the wilds of eastern Oregon, in the shade of the Cascade mountains," and that if there is any scooping done the Bulletin is going to be in on it.

UNIVERSITY BUYS LOT

Purchase of Infirmary is Authorized by Board of Regents

The property on which the infirmary now stands has been bought by the University. It now owns the entire strip of land from the car track on University avenue as far as the property occupied by the University Depot. Authorization of the purchase of this additional lot was made at the January meeting of the Board of Regents here, but legal complications have prevented the transfer of the property until now, according to Karl Onthank, executive secretary.

It is the plan of the University officials in charge of additions to be made to campus buildings in the future to move the infirmary back on the alley which joins University avenue, widening the driveway so that the building will be perfectly accessible, and the old music building now occupied by the extension school will in turn be moved to the present location of the infirmary. This will be done next year in order to allow space on the corner of the avenue and 11th above the car tracks, for the new heating plant, which will soon be under construction.

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MUSIC PLANS MADE FOR COMMENCEMENT WEEK

Programs Prepared by Faculty; Glee Clubs to Sing

Programs for the musical events of commencement week have been, for the most part, completed and arranged, according to an announcement made by John Stark Evans, associate dean of the school of music, yesterday.

On Thursday evening, June 22, when the Failing-Beeckman contest is held several of the advanced students of the school of music will give numbers between the orations.

The following evening, June 23, the men's and women's glee clubs will give their annual concert on the lawn west of Villard, after the flower and fern procession. This will take place at 8 o'clock, and the program Mr. Evans has arranged to be given is one that is particularly suited for twilight. The men's club will sing a group of Oregon songs, followed by "Carry Me Back to Old Virginia," "Just a Song at Twilight," and other old favorites. In addition to these they will sing "Shores of Sighing," Chaffin; "Love Symphony," Damrosch; "Archer's Marching Song," Smith; "Lassie o' Mine," Walt; "Castilla," Protheroe; and "Song of Winter, Hawley.

Some of the things the women's club will give are a group of Cadman's Indian songs; "By the Waters of Minnetonka," Lieurance; "Pale Moon," Logan; "Plantation Melody," Taylor; "Songs My Mother Taught Me," Dvorak; "If My Songs Had Airy Pinions," Hahn.

The men's quartet, Curtis Phillips, John Stark Evans, Wilbur Phillips and Aubrey Furry, which has proved to be exceedingly popular, is to be featured extensively. Soloists with the clubs will be Joanna James, soprano, Gwladys Keeney, soprano, Vera Price, contralto, Aubrey Furry, bass, and Roy Bryson, tenor.

Sunday morning, June 25, special music has been planned for the baccalaureate service, to be held in the Methodist church at eleven o'clock. "Lead Kindly Light," Newman, for which Cyril Jenkins has written new music, will be sung by the University choir with Roy Bryson, tenor, as soloist. A solo is to be given by Aubrey Furry, bass and the men's glee club are to sing "Hymn Before Action," Kipling-Baldwin. On Sunday afternoon, Madame Rose McGrew, soprano, and Dr. John J. Landsbury, pianist, of the school of music, are to present a recital in the Methodist church. Their program has not yet been completely gotten together, with the exception of one of Hiller's concertos, which Dr. Landsbury will play, with an organ accompaniment, by John Stark Evans.

The music for the Commencement exercises, Monday, June 26, will be supplied by the University Symphony orchestra, under the direction of Rex Underwood, of the school of music.

LIBRARIANS WILL GO TO O. A. C. CONVENTION

Northwest Association to Meet June 11, 12, 13; Miss Humphrey to Debate on Fiction Censorship

At the convention of the Pacific Northwest Library association, scheduled to take place in Corvallis June 11, 12 and 13, Miss Mary B. Humphrey, head of the reference department of the local University library, will have a part in a debate on the question of library censorship of fiction. Miss

Humphrey will represent the affirmative side of the question, although she states that personally she is opposed to library censorship to any marked degree.

"I believe in open shelves as they have in public libraries," said Miss Humphrey when discussing the question, "and especially in a college library, where people are supposed to have reached a point where they are capable of doing their own judging about the books in the library. Of course I do not believe that a library can permit any kind of trash to come into it, but I believe in the vault only as a place for rare and valuable books and not as a place where questionable books should be kept."

Members of the library staff here will attend the convention, the plan being to bring to the Oregon campus members of the association who care to make the trip after the meeting in Corvallis has closed. A program of entertainment has been outlined by the local library and it is expected that about 40 librarians will take advantage of the offer and visit the campus here June 13.

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
