Women's Organizations Take In 127; Men Have 142

KEEN COMPETITION SHOWN

Sixty-five More Bids Accepted Over Opening Last Fall

FROSH BIBLES APPEAR IN MORE COMPACT FORM

Edition Put Out by Associated Students Contains No Advertisements; Frosh Rules Popular

The Oregon "Hello" book, the gift of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon to each student registering at the beginning of the fall term, is smaller and more condensed than was last year's edition. It is the same in spirit and contains all necessary campus information, but all propaganda is omitted.

A new plan was adopted in the publication of this year's "freshman bible", as the small book is popularly called.

Formerly the contract for the book was given over to several men who secured advertising to defray the expenses of publication. This year it is entirely the work of the Associated Students, under the charge of Jack Benefiel, graduate manager. No advertising was used.

In addition to the summary of Oregon traditions, Oregon songs, and a short description of Oregon spirit, the book contains also the constitution and by-laws of the A. S. U. O., the athletic schedule for the year, and what is probably the best read section of the book—rules for freshmen.
