

WIDMER ASKS FOR MORE WRESTLERS

Both Varsity and Frosh Have Winning Team Says Coach

NEW EQUIPMENT ORDERED

Active Training Will Start at Once, Widmer Says

First call for varsity and freshmen wrestlers has been issued by Coach Widmer for next Monday. Although 25 men have been going for the past few weeks, Widmer expects to have double that amount out next week.

A new 24 foot mat has been ordered, and will be here soon. Plenty of room will be available for the bone-crushers. At present there are two mats in the outdoor gym, one of 18 feet and the other 16.

Coach Widmer will pick out the best men, as after Christmas he will work with those wrestlers who have the best chance of making either the varsity or frosh squads. The varsity and the frosh wrestlers will be worked together so that the new men will have a chance to learn the finer points of the game from the men who have had experience.

Men to Co-operate

The men that do not make the squad will be assigned a varsity wrestler to work with, so that they may learn the fundamentals of wrestling. According to Coach Widmer, the new men that are showing up best in preliminary training, are those that are working out with men who were on last year's squad.

"The prospects of a winning team this year are very bright in both the varsity and the freshman teams," said the coach. "All of the members of the varsity squad of last year will be back, except Bradway who wrestled at 153. The frosh look good, and I believe they will come out in flying colors."

First Match With O. A. C.

Both the varsity and frosh teams will have five weights, 125, 135, 145, 158, and 175. The first varsity match will be with O. A. C. here on February 9. The schedule of the frosh team has not been completed as yet, but it is expected that they will have three matches this year.

Coach Widmer says that the men who expect to wrestle on house teams should come out now, and it is probable that a mat will be assigned to each fraternity. All varsity men are requested to report for wrestling material, as active training will start at once.

PHYSICAL ED MAJORS WILL WRITE THESE

Seniors of Department Choose Subjects Requiring Personal Observation and Research Work

An innovation in the department of physical education for women is the system of senior major theses which is being tried this year for the first time. Each senior in the department this year must have a problem completed for graduation. About ten women are preparing their problems this year.

One of the most interesting problems is that chosen by Harriet Veazie, who is to check up on the campus activities of girls and then look up their health cards and ascertain the connection between success in activities and the condition of health. This will require personal observation as well as research work.

Mildred LeCompte has chosen as her problem a corrective dancing class. She has chosen a group of twelve students from the individual gymnasium classes, who have posture and foot defects. Her object is to see if dancing can be used successfully as a corrective measure. Her work will lie mostly within the classroom where she is assisted by Miss Lillian Stupp and Miss Harriet Thompson of the physical education department.

Other subjects for the theses are to determine what can be accomplished in special service work through the playground, the comparative advantages of gymnasium work, games, and sports, and the importance of intramural athletics. All these problems will be almost entirely matters of research work.
