JUDGES FROM FACULTY

Loving Cup to be at Stake as Season Closes

The campus debate championship and possession of the Tau Kappa Alpha silver loving cup will be decided tonight when the Delta Zeta and Friendly hall teams meet at 7:30 in the commerce building for the final contest of the do-nut season.

Each of these teams was victorious in the semi-finals held last week to determine the winning mens' and women's house, Delta Zeta scoring over Hendricks and Susan Campbell halls and Friendly over Beta Theta Pi and Psi Kappa.

Cup and Shield Won

As a result of those debates, Delta Zeta won possession of the cup offered by Zeta Kappa Psi, women's national honorary forensic fraternity, and Friendly hall was awarded the shield which Tau Kappa Alpha presents to the men's house making the best showing in intramural debate.

The Delta Zeta team which will meet Friendly tonight is composed of Dorothy Newman and May Helliwell, affirmative, and Dorothy Abbott and Mary McCullagh, negative. Friendly's aspirants for the trophy are Harold Hofflich and Truman Sether, affirmative, and Larry Cook and Herschel Brown, negative.

Fights Won Last Year

The only freshman member of the teams is Dorothy Newman. Dorothy Abbott, May Helliwell and Herschel Brown are sophomores. The junior class is represented by Mary McCullagh, Truman Sether and Harold Hofflich. Larry Cook is the only senior.

Judges will be members of the faculty who have had debate experience, or who are interested in forensic work.

Last year Susan Campbell and Phi Gamma Delta contended for the cup, with the result that Phi Gamma Delta triumphed and carried it off.

PERMANENT AWARDS MADE IN ADVERTISING

Portland Company Offers Prizes in Contest

Two permanent, annual prizes, a first one of \$35 and a second of \$20, will be offered hereafter, starting with the spring term of this year, to students taking advertising work in the University school of journalism, by the Botsford Constantine advertising company. The action was brought about through the efforts of David Botsford, vice-president of the Seattle and Portland branches of the firm.

The annual contest will consist of the solution of some advertising problems prepared each year by the company, which will also act as the judges. The same company gave a similar reward three years ago.

"I am highly gratified over the offering of these prizes, not only because of the interest which will be stimulated, but because of the recognition by the Botsford Constantine company, which is one of the more important advertising agencies of the northwest, and the only agency in the northwest which is a member of the American Association of Advertising Agencies," said Professor W. F. G. Thacher, of the University school of journalism.

Mr. Botsford and other officials of the company have frequently spoken before advertising classes on the campus. Randolph Kuhn, graduate of last year, is an account executive of the firm.

CARDS SHOW INCREASE IN WEIGHT OF FROSH

Women's League Sells Apples, Milk and Crackers Between Meals; Dr. Stuart Approves

Judging from records and statistics kept by Jane Gavin, of the physical education department, college life is not as strenuous as it seems. When the last freshman woman stepped off the scales after weary hours of waiting for the examination at the beginning of the term, 155 cards were stowed away, bearing the record of 155 women underweight, to the sorrow of a few and the delight of many.

After one month of school, every card shows an increase for its owner, twenty-two women having gained from seven and one-half to ten pounds. The weight is taken each week and the result carefully recorded.

A booth has been installed in

the department under the auspices of the Women's league, with the approval of Dr. Bertha Stuart, and milk and crackers are sold. The milk is kept on ice and women who are underweight are urged to drink milk twice a day. However, the hungry overweights are not neglected, for apples are sold also, with the guarantee that not one ounce will be gained.

Of the sophomore women, 120 are underweight, but the gaining record is not so large. Students are urged to sleep and eat regularly and a careful check will be made at the end of each term.

FILTER INSTALLED IN MEN'S SWIMMING TANK

Pool Ready After Being Closed Three Weeks for Construction of Water Purifier

The new filtering system which has been installed in the swimming tank of the men's gymnasium has been completed and the tank was opened yesterday morning. Construction work has been going on for the past three weeks.

The system has made the tank one of the most modern in the state. The filterer consists of two tanks which will filter 100 gallons of water a minute. The swimming tank, which has a 70,000 gallon capacity, can be filtered in 12 hours. Pure water will come in and impure go out in steady streams. The two tanks are filled with chemicalized sand and gravel.

The new system will greatly decrease the cost of water for the department. Formerly the water was changed every week and was not highly sanitary. With the new filter system the water can be used for more than a month and will be purer and more sanitary than under the old method.

GIRL RESERVES TO MEET

Helen Price, National Board Officer, to Give Advisory Work

A training course for Girls' Reserve corps advisory work will be given from Friday, December 7, to Monday, December 10, by Helen Price, national officer in the reserve work in the Y. W. C. A., at the campus Y. W. C. A. bungalow.

Meetings to be held during those days have been scheduled for the following hours: Friday, 5 to 6 p.m.; Saturday, 10 to 12 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m.; Sunday, 4:30 to 6 p.m., and Monday, 5 to 6 p.m. Florence Magowan, secretary of the Y. W. C. A., has enrollment cards, which must be filled out by those expecting to take up the course, before a week from Thursday noon. There will be a fee of fifty cents to pay for the material used in the courses.

All University women are eligible to compete. If the work is satisfactorily done by the women, a certificate will be given to each of

them by the national department of the Girls' Reserve work, entitling them to act as official reserve advisers.

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
