"Greater Interest Shelf" is
New Library Idea

LATE WORKS INCLUDED

Plan to Stimulate Campus
Intellectual Activity

A list of books for the first group of the new greater interest shelf in the library has been made out and the sections will be ordered within the next few days in order that the shelf may be ready for the first of next term.

This plan of having noteworthy books of special interest, the latest works of authors of real authority, is a new idea of Mrs. Mabel McClain, circulation librarian, and Dr. H. D. Sheldon, dean of the school of education, and other members of the faculty. The aim is to stimulate the general movement towards campus intellectual activity.

Books Are Noteworthy

In this first group of noteworthy books for the special interest shelf, which will contain works on the all subjects, those included in the general interest list are: "The Heretic of Seana" by G. Hauptmann; "Creative Spirits of the Nineteenth Century," by George Brandes; "The Story of Utopias," by Mumford Lewis; "Beasts, Men and Gods," by F. Ossendowski; and "Cesare Borgia," by R. Sallustiani.

First travel books for the shelf are: "Island—India," by Augusta DeWitt; "Wandering in Northern China," by Harry A. Franck; "My Adventures in Bolshevik Russia," by Odette Keun; "A Woman's Impressions of German New Guinea," by Lillian Overell; and "Japan," by H. H. Powers.

Biographies Included

Biography works to be ordered in the first group include: "The Life Story of Pierre and Marie Curie," by Marie Curie and translated by Charlotte and Vernon Kellogg; "My Musical Life," by Waller Damrosch; "Some Victorian Women, Good, Bad, and Indifferent," by Harry Furniss; "The Life of Sir William Harcourt," by A. G. Gardiner, in two volumes; "My Intellectual Life," by Maxim Gorky; "Garrigues of an Octogenarian Editor," by Henry Holt; "Sanderson of Oundle," by H. G. Wells; and "Journal of Marie Lerner," by Marie Lerner.

"Harvard Memories," by Charles W. Eliot; "The Latin Genius," by Anatole France; "Freedom of the Mind in History," by Henry Osborne Taylor; "Little Essays of Love and Virtue," by Havelock Ellis, are some essays selected for the collection.

Dealing with educational subjects are: "New Education in Europe," by E. P. Dutton; "Oxford Lectures on Education," by Rudolph Steiner; "A Modern College and a Modern School," by A. Flexner; and "The Older Universities of England," by Albert Mansbridge.

Science Works Named

"Science Remaking the World," by Otis W. Caldwell and Edwin E. Sloan; "Science of a Biologist," by Julian Huxley, are the first scientific books ordered for the collection, and "The Making of the Western Mins," by Stawell, and "Revolutionary New England, 1691-1776," by James T. Adams, are books of history.

Religious books are "Tutankhamer, Amenism, Atenism and Egyptian Monotheism," by Sir E. A. Wallis Budge; "The Mysticism of St. Francis of Assisi," by D. H. S. Nicholson.

Books coming under the heads of politics and current affairs are: "The Mirrors of France," anonymous and translated by Winifred Katzin; "The Genesis of the War," by Rt. Hon. Herbert H. Asquith; "Young India," by Mahatma Gandhi. Econo-

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mies, labor and sociology: "Out of Work," by G. D. H. Cole; and "The Prospects of Industrial Civilization," by Bertrand Russell.

"A Study of American Letters," by Thomas Beer; "A Study in 18th Century Humanism," by Percy H. Houston; "Days and Nights," by Arthur Symonds, and "The Waste Land," by T. S. Scott, are books to be ordered from criticism, belles lettres, and literature groups.

McARTHUR FUNERAL WILL BE SATURDAY

Many Members of University Staff to Attend; A. S. U. O. Sends Condolence Letter

The funeral of C. N. McArthur which will be held in Portland Saturday afternoon will be attended by a number of members of the University staff. A letter of condolence to Mr. McArthur's brother has also been sent from the office of the A. S. U. O. and signed by Claude Robinson.

Services will be held at Trinity Episcopal church at 2 o'clock and Dr. A. A. Morrison will officiate. Mrs. McArthur and her mother will arrive from New York on Saturday in time for the funeral.

Mr. McArthur's prominence in the state and loyalty to the University makes his loss keenly felt on the campus and it is probable that a large representation of the University staff will attend his funeral to pay a last tribute to him. Among those who will go to Portland for the occasion are President and Mrs. P. L. Campbell, Colin Dymont, dean of the college of literature, science and the arts, Dean Walker, assistant dean of men, and "Bill" Hayward, athletic trainer.

OLD PLANT TO BE LAB

Astronomers to Have New Quarters When Boilers are Removed

As soon as the old steam plant is dismantled Professor E. H. McAlister, of the astronomy department, will have a new laboratory for his classes. According to McAlister, the astronomy department and classes in the strength of materials will take over the new lab as soon as the two old boilers now occupying the space are removed.

At present Professor McAlister's department has no laboratory of its own. "We use the big and wide outdoors, especially at night, for most of the astronomy," he says. "And get along the best we can in the rest of the work needing lab space."

Process Explained

He briefly explained the process over which the electricity travels to reach the lamp. Working backwards, he traced its course from the lamp through the wires, and via transformers, to the power house. He told of the dynamo and how it works. "This is what supplies the electricity," he declared. "And it is the power required in turning a dynamo that I refer when I make the comparison of a man's working ability with the energy consumed by one a hundred watt lamp."

The dance is to be held at the College Side Inn, the evening of

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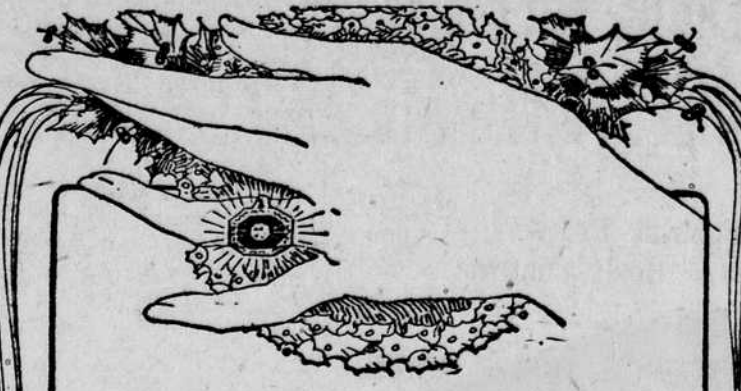
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
