

PAUL PATTERSON WINS IN ORATORY

Hilton Prize of \$50 Given in Law School Contest

THREE TRY OUT IN MEET

Seizure of Liquor in Homes Is Subject for Talks

Paul L. Patterson, a first year law student, won a prize of \$50 for the best speech in the Frank Hilton oratorical contest for law students held Thursday night at the Anchorage. Other contestants were Arthur Rosebraugh and Allarick Hagglund, both of whom are third year law students.

The award of \$50 is a donation of Frank H. Hilton, a lawyer of Portland and a Stanford graduate. Thursday's contest was the second one held. Howard McCulloch of Portland was the winner last year.

Liquor Seizure, Topic

The speeches were 20 minutes in length on the question, "Should there be any change in the law relative to the seizure of liquor in a person's residence and the use thereof as evidence against the possessor if illegally seized?" The speeches were in the form of arguments. Mr. Hilton submitted the question.

All three contestants presented creditable arguments. The judges' decision was given after 10 minutes deliberation.

Patterson, a member of Phi Delta Phi, law fraternity, and of Bachelorhood, is well known on the University campus as a three-year varsity debater.

The judges of the contest were Charles A. Hardy, Edwin Bryson, and Earl O. Immel, all of whom are Eugene lawyers. Prof. E. H. Decker of the law school acted as chairman.

TROY PHIPPS IS GIVEN EASTERN RESEARCH JOB

Physics Graduate Assistant Goes to New York

Troy Phipps, graduate assistant in the physics department, has been appointed to a position in the engineering department of the Western Electric company. He will report to the company's plant in New York City for duty July 1. The examining committee who gave him his oral examination a few days ago passed him and he is now recommended to the faculty for his master of arts degree in physics.

The Western Electric company is an auxiliary to the Bell Telephone company. It does the company's research work. It has 3500 employees. This is the first man who has gone to a research job with the Western Electric company for years. "When the representative of the company was on the campus not long ago," said Dr. W. B. Boynton, head of the physics department, "he mentioned the fact that we had not sent a man

to his company for several years. The fact that Phipps is going shows that there are positions open in the research field, and it will mean something to the University, too."

Phipps is not certain of the exact nature of his research work. The Bell Telephone company refers all of its problems to this company, and a scientist is detailed to work on it. Phipps will receive in the neighborhood of \$1800 a year to start with, with the possibility of going to \$3000 or \$4000 a year in a short time.

The Western Electric company with its 3500 employees has a floor space of 400,000 square feet. They are said to be the largest industrial laboratories ever devoted to the application of science to human affairs. The studies, researches and developments of these laboratories embrace the whole electrical field and such arts and sciences as can be applied directly or indirectly to the electrical transmission of intelligence.
