Mathematical Society to
Convene June 19

EINSTEIN THEORY TOPIC

Members Will Take Trip
Up McKenzie River

A communication has been received by Professor E. E. DeCou, from Professor B. A. Bernstein, secretary of the San Francisco section of the American Mathematical society, stating that the 1925 meeting of the organization will be held at the University of Oregon. This will be the forty-sixth annual meeting of the society, and the first regular meeting to be held in the Northwest.

De Cou Extends Invitation

The invitation was extended to the society by Professor DeCou at a meeting at Stanford University last spring. It is hoped that this may be made the occasion for an outing, as well as a meeting. For this reason, it was decided at a conference of the members of the University mathematics department, to suggest Friday, June 19, as a favorable date.

This date was chosen as coming just before the opening of the University of California summer session, which is June 22, just after the examinations at Stanford university, ending June 17, and four days after the commencement at the Universities of Washington and Oregon, on June 15.

Bell and Cajori Speakers

An automobile trip into the heart of the Cascades, by way of the McKenzie highway is planned for Saturday, and a general lecture for Friday evening. Suggested speakers for the latter occasion are Professor E. T. Ball of the University of Washington, an authority on the Einstein theory, and Professor Florian Cajori of the University of California, the greatest living authority on the history of mathematics.

MEMBERS OF FACULTY PLAN Y.M.C.A. DRIVE

A luncheon for members of the faculty canvassing team for funds for the University Y. M. C. A. was given yesterday noon in the hut. Professor F. S. Dunn, head of the campaign, was the main speaker, outlining the purposes and methods of the drive.

A quota of \$1,000 is to be raised in the week that the faculty drive will be carried on. Another luncheon will be held at the hut at the close of the campaign next Tuesday. Only men of the faculty will be canvassed as the women will be asked to give their support to the Y. W. C. A.

The canvassing committee consists of ten teams of two members each which have been assigned to different departments of the University, each team being assigned the faculty members in one certain building. It is hoped by the committee heads that in this matter the canvassers will be able to more easily get in touch with those whom they are to see.

The sources of income of the campus association outside of that raised by the student body were outlined at the luncheon yesterday. Church boards give \$1500 to its support, Eugene citizens donate \$1200, the faculty appropriates \$1000 and \$400 is received from each of two sources, the Portland district, and parents and alumni.

WOMEN TO ORGANIZE GROUPS FOR DISCUSSION OF PROBLEMS

Trial Meetings Held Last Winter Term; Y. W. C. A.
Arranges for Leaders

A compact organization for leadership in discussion groups among the women of the campus has been arranged by the world fellowship committee of the Y. W. C. A. T. committee under the direction of Ellen McClellan, chairman, is furthering the work of discussion groups which inconspicuously operated last year. The new organization hopes to create a campus interest in world problems and to create fellowship between foreign and American students.

The discussion groups will not be limited. But in order that they may operate efficiently, a leader for each group will be appointed. The groups will meet every two weeks, from 6 to 7 o'clock.

Mildred Bateman is in charge of the discussion group committee. She announces the plans of the committee. All foreign countries will be studied. The social life, the political conditions, industrial developments, geographical conditions that may have influenced each nation in its relation to other nations, the educational aspects and the religious influence of the nation will be discussed. With a thorough understanding of the problems of foreign nations and a knowledge of those of the United States, it will be possible to understand the relation that exists between the United States and other nations.

Every session will have two leaders. One leader will lead the discussion of these topics from a

A new organization made up of history majors and others interested in history last night formed a new permanent organization on the campus. Two committees, one to draw up a constitution and arrange for membership and a second to arrange for programs, were appointed by Henry Sheldon, chairman.

A special meeting will be held next Wednesday evening to determine further policies. Other members of the history department and those interested in history are expected to attend.

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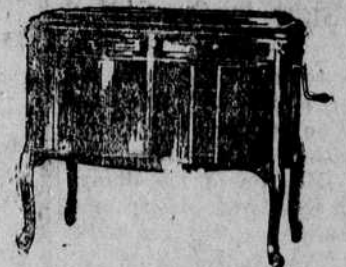
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
