PLAYER AIDS TEAM

With the prospects brighter than they have been for several years for Oregon having a very strong baseball team, the chances for a championship nine were considerably strengthened with the temporary addition of Ray O'Donnel to the coaching staff.

O'Donnel is spending considerable time at present in aiding Billy Reinhart to coach the team's batteries. He was formerly catcher for the St. Louis Nationals, during the managership of Roger Bresnahan, and although he has not played for over ten years, he still remembers the fine points of the game. O'Donnel is also giving some pointers on sliding and a few hints to the various members of the team on how to hit.

NEW FIELD USED

Wednesday night, the Oregon ball squad held their initial workout on the new baseball diamond adjoining Hayward field. Although the field is far from finished, the infield is in almost perfect shape and from present indications, the infield should soon rival that of any on the Pacific coast for playing condition. The outfield has not been worked over to any extent up to the present time, however as soon as the infield is finished, the outfield will be made over so as to be in good playing condition by the opening of the season.

A large share of the credit for the fine work done on the new baseball diamonds belongs to Bob Harrison, recent caretaker. Harrison has had considerable experience working on Pacific coast ball parks and has certainly added to his reputation by the creditable work done on the Oregon field.

GOOD TWIRLERS ARE ASSET

"A chain is no stronger than its weakest link"—or a baseball team is no stronger than its pitchers. More than one Oregon diamond team has been halted in a championship battle by the weakening of the twirling staff. This year, however, the varsity has the prospects of an unusually dependable hurling squad. At present there are about eight pitchers working out. Among this list are: Carl Knudson, Harry Dutton, Fred Harrison, Ray Williams, Skip Brooks, David Adolph and several other likely candidates. With this crew to select a varsity twirling staff, Coach Reinhart should be able to develop a good staff.

BART SPELLMAN NOW COACHING

The turnout of the University of Washington football squad for spring practice last Wednesday is of considerable interest to Oregon sport fans. The reason is that Bart Spellman, former Oregon line coach made his first official appearance as assistant Washington coach on that day. Over 50 Huskies turned out. To aid in the spring football program at Washington, interclass grid games are scheduled. These games are played during the spring workouts and greatly help the coaching staff in finding any likely candidates for the varsity eleven in the fall. Out of the fifty candidates that turned out, only two lettermen reported.

A lecture on the Three Sisters country was given by Professor Edwin T. Hodge, of the geology department, before the chamber of commerce, Friday evening. taking of the girls to the formal dinner. Through the co-operation and courtesy of the Eugene chamber of commerce, 25 cars will be in attendance to carry the girls to Nimrod Saturday morning.

Alberta McMonies, chairman of the printing committee, spoke briefly on the functions of that group, and told the girls of the contest which is being held for a design for the formal dance program cover. Miss Maude Kerns, head of the normal arts department, has charge of this contest, and a prize of \$5.00 is being offered by the committee. Anyone is entitled to submit designs, and full particulars can be obtained from Miss Kerns.

Marie Myers, head of the registration committee, told of the functions of her committee, and urged everyone to feel themselves personally responsible for the entertainment of the delegates. The train committee, under the direction of Louise Inabnit will meet the girls at the station, conduct them to the Administration building, where they will register, and distribute them to their respective houses. The registration committee, headed by Jane Bodine, will

be at work in the Administration building, and the information bureau, also under Miss Bodine's charge, will function the entire week. A hostess committee, in charge of Vivian Harper, has been established, to give the delegates a personal welcome. This committee will consist of several girls in each living organization.

Hilda Chase, in charge of the housing of the delegates, announced that any girl who had affiliations with any of the houses on the campus would stay there; the others would be apportioned out, according to numbers. Anna DeWitt, in charge of the program, outlined it briefly, reminding the girls of the fact that registration was Wednesday morning from 8:30 to 10:00. Maurine Buchanan, secretary of the League, who has had charge of the correspondence with the delegates announced that so far, only seven of those schools heard from could not send delegates. The convention embraces all the colleges and universities west of the Appalachian mountains, and about 100 girls are expected.

Elizabeth Cady, chairman of the publicity committee, told the girls of the work that her committee was doing, adding that posters are being made in the art department under the direction of Miss Kerns. Members of the elementary news-writing classes will be appointed to cover the different sessions of the convention.

The treasurer's report was made by Anna DeWitt, and announced by April Frolic, April 11, was made by Mary Clerin. She urged all of the houses to turn in a detailed report of the cost of their stunt to Doris Brophy, in charge of the affair. A colored spotlight will be used on the stunts this year, and if any particular color is desired by any house, they should see Lillian Luders who is taking care of this part of the program. COURSES FOR SUMMER TOTAL ONE HUNDRED

"Nearly one hundred courses will be offered at the 1925 campus summer session, including many subjects of particular interest to members of the teaching profession," reads a statement in a recent issue of the teaching profession, reads a statement in a recent issue of the University of Oregon News Bulletin, sent to teachers all over the state. The session opens June 22 and runs until July 31.

These courses will include the following fields: English, history, education, modern languages, economics, political science, chemistry, physics, mathematics, psychology, philosophy, journalism, physical education, library training, drama and the speech arts, and music.

The campus session will make use of all regular University equipment including the library, laboratories, and the gymnasium. Recreation will be found on the playing fields and the special trips that are given every year to points of scenic interest. Besides the regular members of the University staff, there will be several visiting instructors of national reputation in the field of education. There will be the regular daily assemblies.

Some of the speakers at the assemblies will be Dr. A. A. Goldenweiser of New York, a lecturer, author, and noted student of anthropology and sociology. He will be a member of the Eugene faculty. Dr. Edward Hulme of Stanford university will give two history courses, and Burlingame of Stanford and Superintendent Price of Oklahoma will give assembly addresses.
