Graduates To Aid Present Athletes Financially

Alumni athletes are united. Recently the University club in Portland was the scene of a gathering of former Oregon lettermen who are now organized into the Portland alumni association of the Order of the "O." Six men from the Oregon football team of '99 were at the meeting: James Sheehy, '18, author of an article on the organization in the last "Old Oregon" says of the fact "enough to assure anyone that loyalty beats deep in their hearts—that their alma mater was ever before them."
