

R.O.T.C. TO COMPLETE PARADE DRILLS TODAY

Twenty Seniors to Receive With Commander

Today's battalion parade of the University R. O. T. C. unit will complete the series of six weekly drill ceremonies, which have been put on by the military department in connection with the regular course of instruction during the last term. The parade will be held at 5:15 on the R. O. T. C. drill field.

Twenty senior students, who have completed the second year of advanced work in the department, and who will receive their commissions as second lieutenants in the reserve corps upon graduation, will receive the parade with the regular battalion commander.

Being in the nature of a resume of the military activities for the year, these parades afford a comprehensive view of the work which is being done by the local R. O. T. C. department. Great interest has been shown in the drills by the cadets, and have also attracted much attention on the part of University students and faculty, as well as townspeople.
