ALPHA KAPPA DELTA WILL INSTALL CHAPTER

MAGAZINE WILL PRINT ARTICLE BY ROJANSKY

Vladimir Rojansky, research assistant in mathematics at the University, has received the final proofs of the article describing his hydro-oscilloscope, which is to appear in the December number of the Journal of the Optical Society of America.

"The hydro-oscilloscope serves for lectures in alternating currents. It represents some phenomena found in alternating electric currents, by means of a water-flow analogy," said Mr. Rojansky.

The initial stimulus of the idea came from Prof. B. H. Brown, of Whitman college, where the first model was built. For several months E. J. Wortman worked on the model with Mr. Rojansky. The final model was constructed here.

LOST LAKE TRADITION PROVES ONLY A MYTH

Oregon Students Sound Lake, Locate Bottom

Three students, John W. Bean, Samuel Ritchie and Herman Meirjurgan last Sunday sounded Lost Lake above Coburg near the McKenzie highway, which is traditionally bottomless, and found that

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the tradition was a myth. The lake has a bottom, although it is 65 feet from the surface in the deepest places, was the report turned in by the investigators.

"Lost Lake is of real interest geologically," declared Meirjurgan, who was interviewed, "because it gives a sort of index to the structure of the surrounding country. It is probably a depression in an old lava flow, and is one of a series of small lakes. Most of the others have been filled up, and Lost Lake is the most outstanding one which remains. This discovery has settled up an old controversy."

A contour map was also made of the lake which is available for perusal of any students who are interested. It may be found at the Geology department in Condon Hall.
