of the constitution. "The constitutional revision committee has given all changes in the constitution and bylaws careful consideration," he said. "The new constitution will be a decided improvement over the old and I hope the students will vote for it."

The past two years have registered a decline in the voting percentage of the student body with 71 per cent voting in 1924 and 68 per cent in 1925. With only two offices uncontested this year, the elections are expected to be very close, especially since the more important positions such as the presidency, vice-presidency, junior man on the executive council, and Emerald editorship are sought by two or more candidates.

No Fees, No Vote

A warning has been sent out by the election officials that no student can vote who has not paid his fees. An official roll, passed by the registrar, will be used to check students as they vote and any not on the list will be barred.

The fact that none of the candidates have announced platforms makes it difficult for those who otherwise know nothing about the candidate running for office, to vote. Although for several years, platforms have not been issued, many students have suggested that this custom be resumed.
