

Theta Chi Star In Hard Fought Tennis Matches

Cadwell, Peterson Make Brilliant Plays, Team Work Steady

Kemmis Cadwell and Tillman Peterson, representing Theta Chi in the intra-mural tennis tournament, fought their way to the championship yesterday on the varsity courts, downing Arleigh Read and Al Vezzie, Friendly hall, in straight sets, 6-2, 6-1, 6-4.

Cadwell and Peterson played with the same confidence and brilliance that has featured their triumphal jaunt through the intra-mural ranks, and had the hallmen completely dumfounded with a pitiless volleying of seemingly endless lobs during the first two sets. Read and Vezzie rallied in the last set and fought desperately to turn the tide of battle, the score going to deuce time and again before the Theta Chi pulled through victoriously.

Cadwell performed brilliantly at the net, smashing and smothering seemingly safe shots with abandon. Peterson ably backed him up in the back court with a fine backhand, and low, tantalizing lobs which were almost impossible to handle.

The Theta Chi won their way into the finals by downing Kappa Delta Phi in the semi-finals Monday, 7-5, 4-6, 6-2, while the hallmen defeated Phi Kappa Psi and Alpha Tau Omega to make their way into the final game. Both Theta Chi and Friendly hall teams are dark horses of the duskier hue, as neither was figured to have a chance to weather the preliminaries when the tournament started. Steadiness and team work had much to do with the success of both duos, with Theta Chi having just a bit too much class when the final test came.

Both Cadwell and Peterson are freshmen, the former of Union and the latter from Portland. Cadwell played center for the frosh football team last fall. Read and Vezzie are old hands at the game, and familiar figures on the local cement.

Eugene Woolen Mills Visited by Members Of Chemical Society

About twenty-five members of the Oregon section of the American Chemical Society inspected the Eugene Woolen Mills factory at Sixth and Mill streets Saturday afternoon. Carl Koppe, one of the owners, showed them through the plant.

Dr. Charles Johnson, of Oregon Agricultural College, later spoke on Phthalic acids, one of a series of artificial organic acids used in analytical chemistry. There are approximately three dozen atoms to these, and his study was in determining the relative positions of the atoms in the molecule.

J. S. Jones, of the Oregon Agricultural College, presented the results of his investigations on growing hard wheat by irrigation. It has always been assumed that this is not possible, but Jones proved by experimentation, that the best hard wheat raised may be equalled with the aid of irrigation.

Mr. Leonard Cooper of the Braun-Knecht-Heiman company explained the problems of a laboratory supply house, the most important of which are filling orders insufficiently made out. The matter of packing supplies for shipment was also explained.
