

### Donut Sports List Increased For This Year

#### Long-distance Swim, Horseshoes, Golf, New Features

#### Basketball Tourney is First On Schedule

An improved list of 14 different intra-mural sports events for both affiliated and nonaffiliated men was announced yesterday for the coming year.

Among new events on the sport roster will be long-distance swimming, indoor baseball, horseshoes, golf, and a swimming pentathlon consisting of five selected events.

For the purpose of enlightening the uninformed it is explained that the idea of donut sports is "to provide opportunity for all men of the University to engage in competitive sports."

A varied program of organization and free lance events has been arranged, making it possible for every man on the Oregon campus to enter into the big sports program in some type of play.

#### Hoop Practice Starts

First on the list of competitive tournaments is the basketball elimination tournament. Teams defeated in their first game can enter the consolation tournament and if successful in this will have another chance at the title.

Last year many boarding houses entered quintets and managed to cop several games before the ax cut them.

Commencing today basketball practices will start in preparation for the opener on October 18. Drawings will be announced later and all aspirants will have a chance at the title.

Men who have taken part in varsity or freshman contests for this or any other college in inter-collegiate competition are not eligible in the events in which they have participated.

Six big classes of competition are arranged for the fall term competition: basketball, cross country running, wrestling, handball, tennis, and swimming.

As an added attraction for the cross country team it has been rumored that Bill Hayward is hatching up some plot whereby amateur Nurmi's will be royally rewarded. Wrestlers will have the last two weeks in the term set aside for them to vent their wrath upon each other. Team competition only is provided for by the donut sports program.

#### Tennis Players Out

In 1925 a mystic quartet who called themselves the "Four Horsemen," all unaffiliated, banded together and won the title.

Free lance singles contests are now being run off in tennis and in the spring term the inter-organization doubles tournament will take place.

In view of all this physical exertion planned on the donut schedule every man, fraternity or otherwise, will get a chance to show his wares in his particular line.

Dig out your basketball shoes—swimming suits—running boots—and cover yourself with glory.
