

Columbia May Give Freshmen A Hard Battle

Cliffdwellers Pile Up Big Score in First Game With Albany

Vincent Harrington, Columbia university coach, is bringing a powerful array of football material down to pit against the freshman gridders in their struggle to be played Saturday. It is true that Columbia lost some of her best men by graduation since last year, but enough reserves were left to form the base of a good team. Harrington has several new men who are showing much talent in chasing a football. By careful planning and much work Harrington has built up a good team.

If comparative scores mean anything, the frosh have the edge on the Cliffdwellers. It is true that Columbia ran all over Albany college last week but the frosh scrimmaged the varsity last Wednesday and held their own. This gives the yearlings the advantage as no one would think of Albany college and the Oregon varsity together as far as football goes.

Victory Hurts
This victory was pretty costly for the Cliffdwellers as four of their best men were injured. All of them except one are expected to get in the game Saturday, but injuries never fail to slow up a team. This week Coach Harrington has been playing safe and only putting his squad through light workouts.

Among the different players are to be found several men who made a name for themselves in Portland high school circles. One of these is Yarter, former Lincoln star, who is playing a great game at center for the Cliffdwellers. He is a rangy lad, an accurate passer, and a demon on defense. At the guard positions will be stationed Schulmerich, a brother of the O. A. C. star, and Owens, a newcomer who is going good. Schulmerich is a veteran player, having been a regular last year. He always plays a fighting game and is certain to cause trouble. Puhols and Moorehouse are slated to play tackle and are both considered good men. Puhols, in particular, has been causing much comment in Portland sports circles. One of last year's stars, Hagen, is again playing end. He is a great defensive player and also snares his share of passes. Davis will probably hold down the other end position. He is a good all-round man.

The team has a veteran backfield although Conrad, one of the star halfbacks, will probably not be in the game as he injured his ankle in the Albany game. Lamb will take his place in the game Saturday while Garrity will fill the other halfback position. Several men have been showing good form in the fight for quarter, but at present it looks as though Cosgrove will get the call. Murphy and Casey will be held in reserve to call signals. Martin will fill the fullback berth. He is also a holdover from last year's squad and is a dangerous man against any team.

The Columbia boys use the Notre Dame style of play as their coach performed there under Knute Rockne. This is Harrington's second season as coach and he has lined up the hardest schedule of games Columbia has had for several years.

He is striving to make it the school's greatest season.
The frosh are working hard to get in shape for this game as the coaches anticipate a real fight from the Irish. In scrimmage with the varsity the other night the team showed flashes of real power, especially in the line. The backs were driving hard and everyone was tackling well. A light practice will be held this afternoon to keep limbered up before the game and the team will go into the fray primed to win. Robinson, Johnson, and Ricks looked especially good in the backfield Wednesday while Ireland, Murray, and Wood played well in the line.
