

### Phi Delta Theta Play Fast Game In Donut Series

#### Third Round Will Begin First of Week; ATO Dropped

Bob Foster, the erstwhile sophomore president, covered himself with glory by leading the scoring with seven points. Elkins, his teammate, crowded him with six points and McCulloch of the ATO's also collected six markers.
