

### Frosh Mermen Outswim Rooks By 44-15 Score

#### Anderson and Silverman Star for Oregon In Victory

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 11—(Special to the Emerald)—The University of Oregon freshman natators outswam the Aggie rooks in the swimming meet here this afternoon, the final score being 44 to 15. Jack Sheehan, sprint star for the rooks, was the only Aggie man to take a first place. He out-started Hatton, frosh swimmer, and won the 50-yard free style event by a close margin.

Charles Silverman, frosh swimmer, usually swims the 440-yard event, but as that race was not listed on the afternoon's program he entered the 220 and 100-yard splashes. He took the 220, swimming a fast crawl stroke, but was nosed out by his team mate Anderson in the century.

The 200-yard breaststroke was the only event that the frosh didn't have two men in the picture. This race was won by Raley of Oregon, but the rooks managed to take second and third.

at this juncture, with Oregon holding the ball in Aggie territory, but being unable to solve the fast man-to-man defense. Milligan scored on a pivot play, taking the ball from Westergren. Shreeve converted a foul by Milligan as the game hit the ten minute mark. The count was 6 to 3, Oregon, here.

**Westergren Plays Good Ball**  
Westergren converted a foul when Burr held him. On a double foul, Milligan tallied and Patterson failed. The play was very rough. Carl Aase replaced Jack Savory at center for O. A. C. Ridings converted a foul by the newcomer, Aase. Soga afterward, Westergren in attempting to intercept the long pass slipped and struck his head on the press table with a resounding whang. He was down for a moment but recovered without taking time out. The crowd applauded. The Aggies took the ball and took several long tries which were ineffectual.

Westergren took the ball, and on one of the prettiest plays of the game, eluded three Aggies under the net and sagged a cripple. This ended the scoring for the half, although the Aggies missed two easy shots and Aase fouled on two foul attempts.

**Graap Finally Scores**  
Milligan took the ball from Ridings' pivot and scored the first basket of the second half. In a mixup under the Aggie basket, Aase got the ball and snapped it through the circle. Graap followed with a field goal when Gunther fell down

in attempting to guard him and left the Aggie captain temporarily unwatched. These Aggie points came in short order. Ridings scored from mid-floor. Milligan converted Shreeve's foul. Westergren dribbled the length of the floor and converted. Okerberg swished the net on Aase's foul at the eight minute mark, and Coach Hager romped Mathews and Hartung in for Patterson and Shreeve, giving the Aggies a new forward combination.

O. A. C. missed a couple shots before Graap connected for a point on Gunther's holding. Longshot Bill Burr made his first impression on the game by pushing in a one-hander while closely guarded. Burr went down, but was up again after taking time out. Westergren dribbled under Mathews' guarding for two points. Okerberg took a long try and connected. Gunther made his only point of the game by con-

verting Hartung's foul for charging. Bill Burr, too. On a slipup on the part of the Aggies, Ridings passed the ball to Okerberg on an out-of-bounds play, and Oker scored unmoled. The Aggies thought it was their in, and were attempting to elude the Webfoots rather than guard them. In a grand and glorious mixup, Bill Burr batted the ball through the net, only to be followed a few seconds later by Westergren who executed a characteristic dribble and tallied to leave the final score 28 to 12 in favor of the Webfoots.

The same teams play here February 22, but the Webfoots have a first mortgage on the championship of the northern division of the Pacific coast conference at present
