Because it is felt by the board of regents that the rapid growth of the University of Oregon has brought about more executive duties than one man can reasonably perform, and because the opportunity has presented itself to the University to add a man of specially high calibre to its staff, Burt Brown Barker, prominent lawyer and educator of Chicago and New York has been named vice-president in charge of public relations of the University, it was announced here following the regular meeting of the regents yesterday.

This step, regarded as the most important to the University since the election of Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall as president, has been taken after a consideration of the present needs of
