## Cougars Pointed for Game With Frosh At Pendleton

### Ashland Game Off; Eugene High Will Meet Babes

College football is comparatively rare in this section of the country which accounts for much of the fervor the approaching battle is creating.

Signal drills, formations, and line work still occupy a greater part of the frosh practice. As yet Coach

Reinhart has not been pointing to any games but has spent his efforts toward instilling Oregon style of football into the squad. The material on hand is now pretty definitely evaluated and the task of developing it remains. Each night's practice includes a vigorous scrimmage session before the babes put up their moleskins.
