Last night Coach Billy Reinhart and his assistants, "Baz" Williams and Bert Kerns, embarked at 6:40 for Pendleton, Oregon, with a tumultuous brood of 20 battle-thirsty Oregon ducklings whose great and burning ambition is to administer to a certain group of Cougar kittens such a reception this afternoon as to stimulate gnashing of Billy Reinhart teeth on the part of W. S. C. historians who must chronicle the event for future Cougar generations. With these sweet intentions Oregon's freshman football squad will swing into action today against the highly touted frosh team from Pullman.

**First Frosh Game**  
This game is the first tilt for the yearlings and they will go in with most of the dope against them. The eleven from W. S. C. has developed a powerful offensive and they have the advantage of one game's experience. They swamped Spokane University 70 to 0 last week and the game could hardly have been called a set-up. If the Oregon babes can put the skid under this team they will have accomplished something bigger than it is usually credited to the feat of painting elephants.

**Both Teams Heavy**  
The Round-up city is expecting to see a real exhibition of football. Both teams will be as heavy as the average college varsity and will

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have plenty of speed. The frosh will probably feature in running the ends and via the overhead route. All the ends and backs are good pass receivers and the team has been showing considerable improvement in the passing department in the last few practices. "Kiz" Kitzmiller will start at full. Judging by the way this blonde boy has been tearing up the sawdust of the frosh practice field of late, he should contribute a great deal toward deflating the Cougar kitten. Bert Tuttich continued to hold down right half. He is the speed demon of the yearling crew and the W. S. C. freshmen will need bicycles to keep track of him. John Donahue will pair with Tuttich in the opener. He is a good ball carrier and can provide good interference when his teammates are toting the ball. Bill Parke is a last minute darkhorse for the signal barking job. He will start the game in place of Don Kelly who will be used probably in the Columbia game Saturday.

Bill Laing gets the call over George Chappel at the pivot position. Laing is one of Pendleton's ex-prep meteorites of the grid and will be given his chance to perform again on the home lot.

**Line Berths Secure**  
Austin Colbert is enroute to his guard berth. He will pair with Don Devereau who draws the call over Kenneth Hodgen to start at guard. Devereau and Hodgen have both come to the front in recent workouts to take their turn as regulars. George Christensen and Marion Hall will start at the tackles. Christensen is the heavier man, straining the beam past the 200 mark, but Hall, is not far behind in weight and is the tallest man on squad. Bob Eckman and Norman Jesse will be reserve tackles. Ed Moeller and

Woodward Archer draw first end selections though Lyle Harrington and Mayhew Carson stand a good chance of getting at the Cougar kittens before the final gun is fired. Leon Stein, Francis Hill, and Ed Dvorak will make the trip as reserve backs.

Saturday, the frosh will return and meet Columbia University on Hayward field at 1 o'clock. Saturday's game starts early so as to be over before the Order of the "O" gridgraph at McArthur court starts to flash the O. A. C.-Stanford game from Portland.

A game has also been scheduled with Medford for a second frosh team Saturday afternoon at Medford. The line-ups for this game and the Columbia tilt are not settled as yet but will be given in tomorrow's Emerald.
