### Prospects Not Known: Fall Games Reveal Fast Games

### Coach Leslie Asks For Large Turnout

### Four Games With O. S. C. Rooks Scheduled

With the ending of the freshman gridiron year comes the opening of basketball season for the yearling Webfoots. Next Monday is the day, according to Spike Leslie, who is to again have charge of the fortunes of the frosh maple court activities at the University.



"I want all freshmen who are intending to turn out for the squad to be on hand for the first practice, Monday afternoon from 5 till 6 in the Men's Gym," said "Spike" Leslie, Coach Leslie. The object of turning out this

term is to get a line on the material in school and to get acquainted with the men, so that next quarter the squad can get down to business immediately.

"We will have a little over a week to work out before final exams," states Leslie, "and I want a big turnout for this period." Basketball aspirants who are low on grades are requested to see the coach at this first turnout and arrangements will be made to excuse them from practice for the remainder of the term.

#### Prospects Mystery

What the prospects are for this season's duckling squad is pretty much a mystery as yet, but the coach is hopeful for an improved quintet over the frosh squad last winter term.

As usual, rumors are current about a number of excellent prospects that shall make a great frosh five, but Leslie gives little credit to these early season predictions and will wait till the men show their stuff before he offers anything definite in the way of the team's prospects.

Only four games are actually scheduled for the frosh to date, these being with the O. S. C. rooks, but Leslie is planning on a number of trips for the yearlings.

The frosh usually go south for a series of games and take one or two jaunts to Portland, where they take on the city high schools. Portland and southern Oregon teams will play here on the campus, also.

#### May Be Two Squads

Leslie would like to have two squads, one to play high schools of the state and one to meet the Aggie rooks and other small college teams

such as Linfield, Monmouth, etc., but at present these plans are only tentative.

There has been a number of babes playing in the intramural basketball league who show much promise, according to Leslie. A number of prep-school luminaries are expected from the ranks of the frosh football team that recently climaxed its season with its memorable defeat of the Aggie rooks.

Past records will not be considered in picking the squad, but the men who make the team will do it on their own ability. A number of dark horses may develop who are just as good as the better known players.

The four games with O. S. C. rooks are scheduled as follows: the rooks play in Eugene February 4 and 17, and the ducklings journey to Corvallis February 11 and 24.

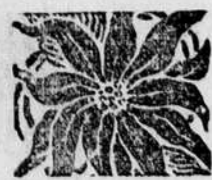

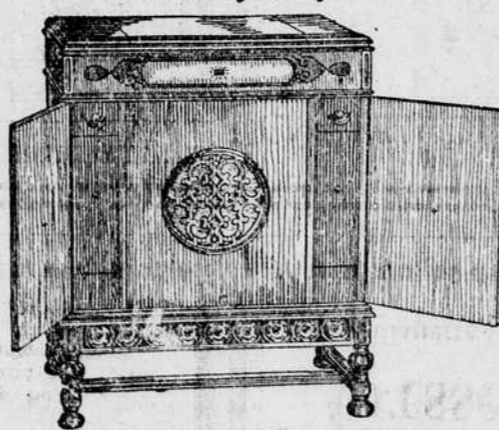

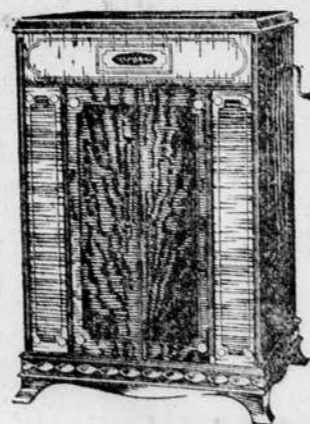
