

Frosh Cagers Please Leslie In Turnouts Practise Early in Year Gives Coach Line On the Players Men From Do-Nut Teams In Frosh Roster

Freshman hoop practice opened its season with a bang Monday evening in McArthur Igloo when 52 yearling cagers turned out in answer to frosh coach "Spike" Leslie's call. Last night a few new faces were added to bring the number close to three score.

Leslie is well pleased with the present outlook. There seems to be plenty of good material on hand, which include among the usual galaxy of prep stars a number of all-state maple court artists.

The main object of this early freshman basketball turnout is, according to Leslie, to get a line on the men, getting acquainted with the players and their abilities in general so that with the opening of next term, practice may start off immediately without any unnecessary preliminaries.

Term's Drill Basic

The drill for the balance of this term will be mostly of a fundamental order, grounding the players in the Oregon style of basketball.

Freshmen who have any intention of turning out for the ducking quintet are urged by Coach Leslie, if they have not already done so, to see him. If they need the time for studies he will excuse them from practice, but it is imperative that he be informed as to their intentions.

A number of men from the doughnut teams are included in the frosh roster. With the exception of one man the entire Eugene state championship quintet that made the trip to Chicago last winter are signed up for practice.

Prep Stars Out

They are Jean Eberhart, Cliff Horner, Max Rubenstein, Bill Pittman, and Austin Colbert. A number of men from football are out, including Woodward Arler, Francis Hill, Ed Dvorak, George Chappell, and John Kitzmiller.

Some other cagers who have been heard from on the prep spotlight are LaVant Holden, Frank Andrews, and Harold Olinger. These are only a few names picked at random as there are others out who have cut their names in the high school hall of fame and are out to make competition tough for this season's ducking five.

Kansas Frosh Lids Differ From Oregon, Says Dick Syring

The cap worn by the freshmen on the University of Kansas campus differs somewhat in make to that of the Oregon frosh, according to Dick Syring, who returned last week from a Sigma Delta Chi convention at Lawrence, Kansas. Syring seemed particularly impressed by the drill put on by the Haskell Indian troop. They have been judged the best in Kansas and are the only Indian troop in the United States.

Conference Year Opens With Idaho Here January 21

With the football season closed, basketball is now the foremost athletic activity on the campus. The Webfooters have begun daily practice in preparation for the conference season which opens with the University of Idaho at Eugene, January 21.

Although Coach Reinhart has introduced a number of offensive tactics to the Webfoots, the preliminary drill in fundamentals is still the important feature of each workout. Pivoting, dribbling, shifting the body, and handling the ball are all included in the nightly sessions.

The large turnout this year has necessitated a division in the squad. Reinhart is working with the first group which consists chiefly of lettermen and reserves from last year's team. Algot "Swede" Westergren, recently appointed as assistant to Reinhart, is working with the second squad.

Last night both squads spent considerable time practicing with the ball under the basket. One man was stationed under the backboard as a guard; two others endeavoring to work the ball down to within easy range for shooting. Few basketball games are won from shots coming from the center of the floor. Reinhart emphasizes the ability of a team to pass and dribble its way under the basket, and the success of Oregon's teams in the past is indicated.
