

Ex-Webfooter Gets Offer From Franklin

Many Events Are Listed For Minor Sports; Trackmen To Elect

Perry Davis, former Oregon swimmer and diver, who graduated from the department of physical education in 1927, has been offered the position of director of physical education at Franklin College, Franklin, Indiana, to take effect next fall, according to an announcement made by Del Oberteuffer, acting head of the physical education department.

At the present time Franklin College has no definite physical education organization, so the work of establishing a department will be Davis' problem if he accepts the position. Davis acted as instructor at Oregon last year, and is now studying for his Masters' degree at Columbia University, New York.

Dr. Homer P. Rainey, president of Franklin College, who made the offer, was formerly a professor at Oregon.

Johnny Anderson, swimmer on last year's frosh team, may be sent to the National Intercollegiate swimming meet in April, according to Edward F. Abercrombie, head coach. Anderson, who is eligible for varsity competition this winter, expects to enter either the 100-yard dash and the 150-yard backstroke or the 440-yard free style. If he registers for the longer distance, he will not enter the shorter.

Anderson is one of the best swimmers ever seen at Oregon, and came very near breaking several Pacific Coast conference records last year. With the added experience gained last season, he is expected to better one or more marks.

The National meet will be held either at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, or at the Naval Academy, Annapolis. Abercrombie placed fourth in the fancy diving event at the first national meet held in 1923 at Princeton University. The meet alternates each year between the east and the middle-west, and as it was held at the University of Iowa in 1927, it will go east this winter.

Abercrombie is again developing several promising freshman swimmers. Chester Floyd, outstanding dash man, bids fair to equal the speed of Johnny Anderson. Floyd was captain of the Hollywood Athletic club team last winter, and William Parke, another frosh, played with the Long Beach high water polo team.

Other men out for the yearling squad are Donald Neer, diver; Valentine Jones and Morris Kinney, dashes; Ronello Lewis, 200 yard breast stroke; Marvin Smith, 150 yard back stroke; Jennings Beard, and William East. Two meets with the O. S. C. rooks and one with the Vancouver Community club are definitely scheduled.

Vaccination of Students Urged By Dr. Miller

More Cases of Smallpox In Lane County Now Than Year Ago

All students who have not been successfully vaccinated within the last five years are urged to do so by the University Health Service. There is more smallpox at the present time throughout the state and especially in our own county than there was at this time last year, according to Dr. Fred N. Miller, University physician.

"This is a disease which can be prevented, and it is a real disgrace for intelligent people to get the disease," Dr. Miller said. The method advocated by the United States Public Health Service is used by the University physicians. The vaccination is painless and involves only a very small area on the arm or thigh. It is not followed by a large scar.

"At the present time there are 12 cases of smallpox in Lane county," (Continued on page four)

The girl approached the registration desk in the Administration building blushing but with a determined expression on her face. "I'm awfully sorry to bother you," she said, "but you have me down for the Sigma Pi Tau house, and really . . . I can't stay there!"

Not once but several times was this complaint lodged by incoming delegates. Two men were registered for the Sigma Beta Phi house and consternation reigned until the mistake was corrected and they were shipped to a more fitting domain.

In between the spasmodic arrivals of the preppers the halls of the building were filled with bored underclassmen waiting for the call "Kappa Sigma here," "Adi Pi," "Tri Delta," "S. A. E.," "Any Beta frosh around?" "Oregon Knight," "Sigma Nu," and all the other Greek letter combinations, as well as the campus dormitories. Some of those waiting yawned outright, some merely closed their eyes or looked into the eyes of other patient pledges.

Tall ones, short ones, long ones, lean ones, the preppers came, sometimes in a tidal wave of bags and galoshes, sometimes singly, or chaperoned by the faculty advisors; all of them being tagged with red, green or blue ribbons, according to the office which they hold in their high school. One girl came back and turned in her little blue ribbon . . . "I'd rather have one like my chum's," she explained . . . and is now booked for the student body president's convention in place of the Press meetings.

Educator From Sacramento To Talk Here Today

W. J. Cooper To Address Assembly on 'Rights—Use and Abuse'

William J. Cooper of Sacramento, superintendent of public instruction for the state of California, is to deliver an assembly address on "Rights—Use and Abuse" at nine o'clock this morning in the gymnasium of the Woman's building.

The assembly was set for this hour in order to enable the high school delegates as well as the University students to be present.

Mr. Cooper, who is scheduled to give a series of lectures for a week of the summer session on the Oregon campus this year, taught a course in social science here a few summers ago. He was formerly the superintendent of schools at San Diego and Fresno. He obtained his bachelor and master degrees at the University of California, and is the holder of an honorary LL.D. from Whittier College in southern California.

Mr. Cooper frequently contributes articles on civics and citizenship to current periodicals.

According to Dean Elmer L. Shirrell, who is acquainted with him, Mr. Cooper is a forceful and interesting speaker. Dean Shirrell will deliver the speech of welcome to the visiting "preppers" in the place of President Hall, who has been ill. Donald Bealar, president of the associated students, will preside at the meeting.

The presence of Milligan at center tonight's tilt is only the continuation of Reinhart's search to find some one to fill the shoes left vacant by Roy Okerberg, star center for the past three seasons. Lanky Iek Reynolds, Ray Edwards and Howard Eberhart have all been taking turns at the pivot position but none have come up to the expectation of the Oregon hoop mentor.

Milligan Vacates Post

Milligan taking a new position at center leaves vacant a forward berth which will be filled tonight by Merwyn Chastain. Chastain performed at guard in a recent Willamette tilt. Gordon Ridings will be at the other forward post.

Joe Bally at guard is another affected by the new change in lineup as this speedy player was stationed at forward in the last Friday night's game. Big Dave Epps, who has seen little under-fire service this season, will draw the other guard assignment. Epps can generally be counted on for a few markers in addition to doing some nice checking.

Forwards Missed This Year

The absence of Captain Mel Ingram and Herb Rotchford, pair of star forwards on the Gonzaga team last year, has been missed considerably by the Spokane school's five, but Coach Clipper Smith will have a formidable quintet on the floor tonight. Le Veaux will probably get the call over Branom at center for the Bulldogs. Le Veaux is a former member of a Washington state all-star high school quintet and, although handicapped by lack of college experience, showed well in the two games played with Montana.

Berilla, Gonzaga Star

At forwards, Coach Smith has "Andy" Berilla, a former star with the Lincoln high school team of Tacoma, and Fred McCarvel, a speedy little fellow from Anaconda, very adept at floor work and the passing game. Berilla is the only one of the duo who has shown any consistent form to date when it comes to ringing the hoop. He is generally high point man for the Catholic maple court performers.

Captain John Kennedy will be found at one guard post for the visitors. Kennedy's distinguishing trait is his consistency. He is in the thick of the fight at all times and is good for a few points during each contest. At the other guard position Gonzaga has Frank Walterskirchen, the diminutive football guard who was mentioned by many sports writers and coaches on near All-American teams. The Spokaneites feel that the length of his name has kept him off of many more all-star football selections.

Walterskirchen is fast, aggressive, a good shot from the distance and a defensive player of excellent ability.

Conference in Boston Attended by F. E. Folts

Dr. Boynton Reminisces of Early Oregon Days; Deady's Changes Told

From the time when physics classes were considered large if they had six or seven pupils in them to the present day when such a course is considered a failure unless there are at least a hundred in it, has been the teaching experience of Dr. W. P. Boynton, head of the physics department, at the University of Oregon.

In 1904, when Dr. Boynton first came to this campus, after doing graduate work at Cornell University, he was greeted with the largest class that had ever enrolled in sophomore physics (they called it advanced then). There were twenty in his elementary classes and only one student taking a course in electrical engineering from him. This student was Ralph Shelly, now head ranger of the Siuslaw forest.

"I not only had classes in physics in those days," said Dr. Boynton, "but I also had a number of classes in mathematics and some physics laboratories to take charge of as well."

The basement in Deady Hall was unfinished then, and it was not until 1914 that it was fixed up so that laboratories could be held in it,

High School Conferences Bring Throng

First of Day's Events To Be Opening Assembly At Nine o'Clock

Delegates To Divide For Group Meetings

Program Draws Experts In Varied Fields

The University of Oregon is to be the melting pot in the next two days for the representatives of 40,000 high school students who filled campus walks and avenues after their arrival yesterday afternoon and evening.

Starting at one o'clock yesterday afternoon, delegates were registered on the main floor of the Administration building, and conducted to the houses which will be their home during the two-day sessions about the common problems of their high school offices.

Registration was carried on until about 11 o'clock last night, and will continue until 9 o'clock this morning so that the late arrivals may get their badges and cards which will admit them to the various events of the week-end.

Three delegates from Coquille were the first to arrive in Eugene for the conference. Kenneth Hansen, Billie King and Stanley Stevens, of that town registered shortly before one o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Marshfield sent the delegation that was next to appear on the scene. John Seofield and Cranson Fesberg from there were among the first to register. North Bend delegates were also early arrivals.

Shirrell To Welcome Guests

The first event on the program will be the University assembly at 9 o'clock this morning when Elmer L. Shirrell, dean of men, will give the official welcoming address to the high school guests.

After the assembly, the conference will divide into four parts. The High School Press association meeting will be held in the Journalism building; the student body officers will meet in the main auditorium of the music building; the principals' conference will meet in the education building; while the Association of Girls' Leagues will remain in the Woman's building.

After the press association has been called to order by David Wilson of Lincoln High, Portland, there will be an address by Eric W. Allen, dean of the School of Journalism, on "Organizing the Staff." This is scheduled to start at 10:20. At 11 o'clock Walter W. R. May, of the Portland Oregonian will deliver an address, also to the press association. His topic will be: "Getting the Right Start." Immediately before noon, Dean Allen will give a summary of the morning's talks.

Luncheon For Faculty

Delegates will eat lunch today at the organizations to which they have been assigned. All visiting high school faculty members, whether or not they are principals, and members of the faculty of the University are invited to attend the principals' and advisers' luncheon at 12:15 (Continued on page two)
