After an organ solo by Frances Pierce, the student body officers' meeting will be called to order at 10:15, by Kenneth Allen, president of the association. Three talks by high school officers will be given this morning. Stanford Brooks, vice-president of the association will give a short talk; Thomas Johnson, Jr., Hood River high school, will

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talk on "Problems Connected with High School Athletics"; and Merrill Stoddard, of Baker, will speak on "Musical Activities as Student Body Functions."

One of the high lights of the conference will be the address by William J. Cooper, California State Superintendent of schools, to the student body officers at 1:30 o'clock today. His address will be on "Real Values." Mr. Cooper is also scheduled to speak at assembly this morning.

Students to Speak. Among the student officers who will speak during the afternoon are Clifford Moore, of Medford High, who will talk on "Methods of Obtaining Town Support for High School Activities"; and Amos Lawrence, of Grant High in Portland, who will speak on "Honor System under Student Body Control."

The press conference will break up into four divisions for conference this afternoon. The first division, editors of high school annuals, will be in charge of Mary Clay Benton, editor of the 1928 Oregonian. This

section will be addressed by Ernest Ellis, of Kennell-Ellis Portrait Studios; Abbot Lawrence, assistant art editor of the Oregonian; and by representatives of printing and engraving companies.

Advertisers Give Luncheon. The first feature of the division which includes managers of high school annuals and newspapers, will be the noon luncheon to be given today by Alpha Delta Sigma, national advertising fraternity. W. F. G. Thacher, professor of advertising, will speak at 1:50 o'clock on "Make-up of Advertisements." Another feature of this section will be the talk at 2:20 by Walter W. R. May of the Oregonian, who will talk on "Sources of Advertisements."

The section of editors of high school newspapers will be addressed by George Turnbull, professor of journalism, on "Newspaper Technique." This section is to be presided over by Ray Nash, editor of the Oregon Emerald.

The section for managers of high school papers will be presided over by Milton George, manager of the

Emerald. This section will be addressed by Eugene S. Kelly, of the Morning Register advertising staff, who will talk on "Soliciting the Merchants of Your Town for Advertising."

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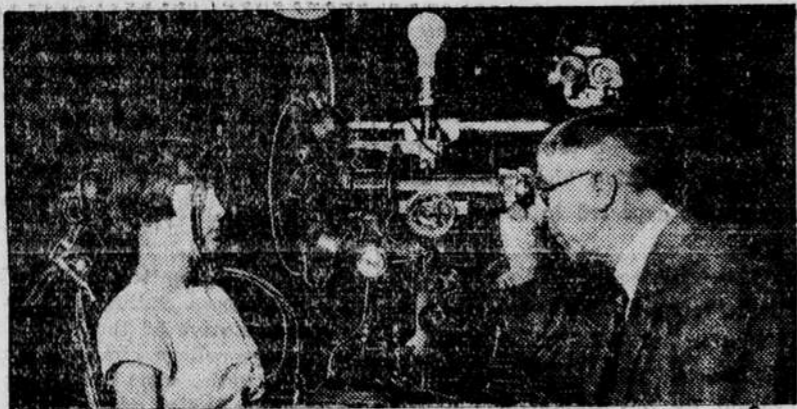
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
