

Husky Quintet Composed of Many Lettermen

Two Former Portland Stars Are on Visiting Team; Snider Shines

When Coach "Hee" Edmundson, Washington hoop mentor, trots his squad of 19 men onto the floor tonight for the preliminary warm-up, he will be presenting the most seasoned group of players to be seen on McArthur court this year. As to lettermen, this lanky tutor has more than you can count on one hand; in fact, he has a even half dozen, three of whom participated for the Purple and Gold for the past two years.

The trio of old timers are Alfred James, guard; John Dalquest, guard; and Bob Brobst, forward. "Alfie" James is the young gentleman who led the Huskies to a 27 to 25 victory over the Whitman college, Missionaries, by scoring 10 points. John Dalquist is another of Edmundson's standbys who started the season out at guard, but has been shifted to center. He stands five foot eleven and weighs 185 pounds. Bob Brobst, although a two-striper, has been watching a great percent of the contests from the bench this year.

It isn't the two year lettermen that have been playing havoc with other conference teams' defense, but a young fellow answering to the name of Monty Snider. Snider, forward, was a member of the team last year and is Edmundson's big scoring threat this year. It was the reliable Monty Snider who helped the Huskies defeat Idaho, 27 to 19. Perry Hack, center, and Hall Johnson, guard, are the other two lettermen.

Portland fans should be interested tonight in the presence of Milton Berenson and Jiggs Jaloff on the Washington casaba squad. Berenson is a former Lincoln high school star and last year was a member of the Husky freshman quintet at center. This year Edmundson has found it advisable to use the six footer at guard, and Berenson has played against the W. S. C. Cougars and Idaho Vandals in this position. Against the Vandals he closely seconded Snider for high point honors with seven markers.

Jiggs Jaloff, forward, has been gaining a favorable place in the Puget Sound sports critics' hearts with his scrappy and lightning-like playing. He played forward on the yearling team last year and was a Grant high school star the year before.

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defeat. Recently they were defeated by Cae Hubbard's College of Puget Sound five, 35 to 21. This contest was no practice game but a hard fought affair in which Edmundson used 11 men in an attempt to win. The Loggers led all the way and at half time the score was 10 to 11. A northern critic commenting on the tilt, said, "Too much grandstand play and individual performance ruined the Huskies' chance to win."

Another game with the Loggers went to the Washington Husky five. Jiggs Jaloff scored 10 points in this contest.

Oregon is enjoying one of the best basketball schedules it has had in a long time. The Webfoots play all their home games before starting on the annual road trip. This all helps, due to the fact that the 1928 hoop machine is composed of many new men.

Summary Budget For A.S.U.O. Compiled

The following summary budget is the second of a series of A. S. U. O. financial statements compiled at Jack Benefiel's office for publication in the Emerald.

An estimate of disbursements and receipts for the period January 1 to August 31 of this year shows an operation deficit of \$3,145.60. The football season in the fall (not included in this report) is the most profitable period of the year for the University since it usually pays for itself and gives a surplus into the treasury for other activities, according to Mr. Benefiel.

Fees Must Be Paid By Today at Twelve, Asserts Comptroller

Today at 12 o'clock promptly the deadline on fee payments will be drawn, and everyone who comes after that hour, or who is waiting in line then, will be required to pay

Monday, with the addition of the late fine.

Up till noon Friday, over one-third, nearly 1200, of the students had not paid. Long, double lines waited in the lobby all day yesterday, and only the early arrivals can possibly be served this morning. "Fee payments are more delinquent than ever this term," said Mr. Lyon of the cashier's department, "and only those students that come early tomorrow will be able to pay."

Faculty Ballots Given to Hoover For Presidency

Membership in League Is Approved; Dry Law Changes Asked

Faculty returns from the recent current questions poll held on the campus Thursday, show that there is no great deviation from the opinions of the students and those of the administration. Herbert Hoover and Al Smith were the dominant candidates of the two parties although Hoover led the field by a large majority.

As to the success of the prohibition amendment, the results also compared favorably with those of the students. The vote stood 61 for and 74 against. And believe it or not, the faculty also stood out in favor of modification of the dry laws. A substantial change was wanted by 72, while 56 voted for more rigid enforcement and 13 for complete repeal.

Faculty for League
A stronger proportion of faculty members than of students desired formal membership in the League of Nations. There were 95 votes cast for membership, 37 for informal cooperation and 10 for complete detachment.

The present governmental policy of intervention in Nicaragua was opposed by a vote of 57 for to 73 against.

Complete returns for the Republican candidates were: Senator Borah, 4; President Coolidge 4; Senator Curtis, 1; Vice President Dawes, 4; Herbert Hoover 78; Charles E.

Hughes 10; and Frank Lewden, 7. The smaller vote of the Democrats was distributed as follows: Governor Al Smith, 25; William McAdoo, 5; Newton Baker, 3; Senator Reed, 2; Governor Ritchie, 2; Senator Walsh, 2; and Governor Donahay, 1.

Senator Glass, Democrat, and Andrew Mellon, Republican, were the only two who did not receive any consideration by the administration.

Both Sexes Agree
Final tabulation of the campus vote Thursday showed that both sexes were quite agreeable for once, with the exception that the women wanted formal membership in the League of Nations while the men favored informal cooperation. A

complete comparison of the votes on the questions follows:
Success of prohibition: men, 195 for; 485 against; women, 150 for, 331 against. Rigid enforcement of dry laws: men, 200; women 222. Modification: men, 408; women 241. Repeal, men, 93; women 30.
Detachment from League of Nations: men, 93; women, 44. Informal cooperation: men, 293; women, 210. Formal membership: men, 218; women, 228.
Governmental policy of intervention in Nicaragua: men, 316 for, 342 against; women, 126 for, 317 against.

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
