

Large Medical Section Planned For the Oregana

Twelve Pages Will Show Campus Activities of Portland School

The medical section of the 1928 Oregana will contain 12 pages, which makes it more extensive than in any previous year. Views about its campus are to be included among the scenes in the front of the year-book.

"We want the Oregana to represent the whole University, the extension division, and medical school, as well as the Eugene work," stated Mary Benton, editor. "Herman Semenov, medical student in Portland, who is editing the medical section and handling the business affairs there, has a very fine section planned."

A double page layout of views will be included in the section, and there will be the story of the school's accomplishments this year. The satire section will include humor from the Portland as well as from the Eugene campus.

Total registration in the medical school this year numbers 230, according to a statement made by Richard B. Dillehunt, dean. Applications for admission to the first year still continue to exceed the available places, and the scholastic standing maintained gives the school unquestioned recognition from educational foundations.

The campus now covers 108 acres on Marquam Hill, which includes Sam Jackson Park. Contracts have been let for a Veterans' Bureau Hospital at a cost of \$1,350,000. This will be constructed on a sight of 25 acres which were deeded by the University to the United States government.

The Doernbecher Memorial Hospital for children is in full operation now and affords exceptional facilities for the department of Pediatrics. Agreement with the Multnomah County Hospital has widened the services there for teaching purposes.

Approximately 20,000 individuals received medical and surgical attention during the last year in the various hospitals and clinics affiliated with the medical school.

Crowding of Tennis Courts To Be Avoided By Plans of Bovard

Plans of the physical education department for the accommodation of tennis players this spring are rounding into shape, according to Dean John F. Bovard, head of the department.

The three tennis courts southeast of Commerce building are to be cleaned up and provided with new nets and lines. This will relieve the congestion of the courts on Emerald street. Two of them will be reserved for faculty use from 4 to 6 each afternoon. The courts will be ready for play by April 1. They have not been in use since the courts now in use were built.

Another important announcement made by Dean Bovard was that there will be no charge for playing on the tennis courts after April 1, the date the old courts are due to be reopened. This benefit is to be wholly for University students and faculty. Townspeople and any others will be required to pay the same fee as before.

Classes in tennis will be held in the morning next term as much as possible, says Dr. Bovard. Varsity and freshman practice are to be held at regularly arranged times and the rest of the day the courts will be open to anyone. Choice times when there is a practical certainty of getting a court are from 6 to 8 in the morning and from 5 in the afternoon till dark.

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Physical Education Department Will Hold Open House Feb. 16

The physical education department for women will be at home Thursday afternoon, February 16 from 4 to 6, to all those desiring to observe the work of the respective classes. This open house is for townspeople as well as for those on the campus. It is not an exhibition, but merely an opportunity for observation of regular classes.

From 4 to 4:30 five classes will be in progress, beginning dancing, Danish gymnastics, lacrosse, life saving methods and individual gymnastics. During the half hour the guests will be conducted from one class to another by student guides

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and will remain with each class four or five minutes.

At 4:30 the program will change and the classes open to observation will be: advanced dancing, elogging, advanced swimming, and individual gymnastics. From five until six an intramural basketball game and a swimming meet will be held. In the individual gym a tenkoi game will be in progress at this time.

Another point of interest is that tea will be served in the sun-parlor of the Woman's building from five to six.

Miss Wills now plans to leave for the east and Europe some time toward the latter part of March, she said today.

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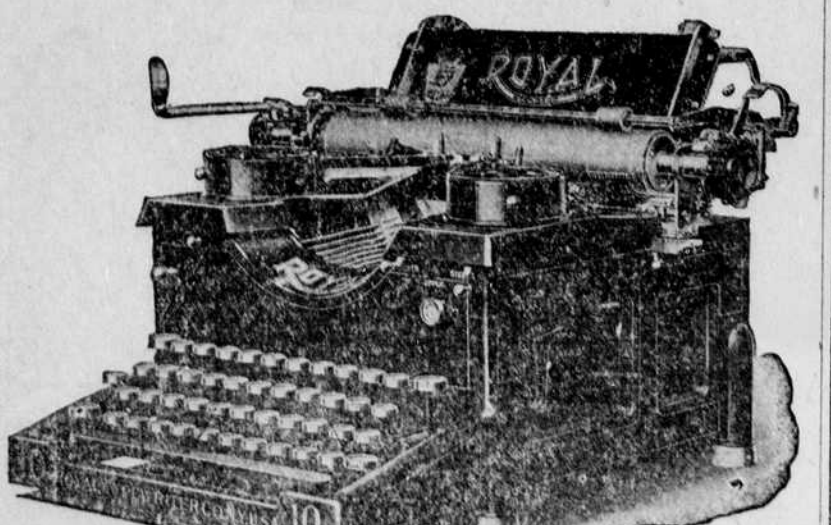
