

# Oregon Drills In Team Play

## McEwan Training Webfoot For Opening of the 1928 Season

With more than fifty candidates turning out for spring football practice, Captain John J. McEwan, Webfoot coach, is mauling the basis of his team play for next fall. Two complete practice games toward the end of the term will conclude the preliminary training season.

Throughout the winter football session the Oregon coach devoted his time to individual development, but at present he is working his men in direct preparation for the opening of the 1928 grid season. The Stanford game will be played in Eugene on October 6, which necessitates the early season start.

### McEwan Directs Work

McEwan is handicapped to a certain extent by the temporary lack of assistants. Gene Vidal, backfield coach, is not yet on the campus, which leaves Dick Reed, last year's line coach, the only aid on hand. Bob Mautz, end coach, will report next fall, and along with the coaching duties he will do some scouting. Spike Leslie, who is to assist with the guards and the tackles, is now directing the frosh baseball squad, and is unable to help McEwan.

Although practically the entire work of coaching the team during the spring practice is falling to McEwan, it will undoubtedly be an advantage to the team. Under the direct and personal supervision of the head coach, some great improvements are sure to be noticed when the Webfoots play the first game next fall.

### Weight on Line

All last season Oregon was hampered by the lack of weight on the line. On at least two occasions victory was in sight but only to be lost again due to the weakening of the forward line. Many scores were made against Oregon last year that would have never happened had there been a little more heft on the line.

This coming year, however, will see change in the appearance of the line. The weight which was so woefully lacking will be supplied by candidates from last year's freshman team, and from holdover varsity material.

### Three Centers

George Stadelman, who was one of the outstanding centers on the coast last season, will be back at his position this year. Two other men, George Chappell, and Phil Ireland, will make strong bids for the berth, but neither are thought to be on quite the same standard as Stadelman. Chappell was regular center on the 1927 freshman team, and Ireland alternated with Stadel-

man on the frosh team of two years ago.

Merrill Hagah, Everett McCutchan, and Tom Weems are the veteran linemen who will be ready again next fall. Scott Warren, substitute last year, and Austen Colbert, Marion Hall, George Christensen, Jerric Lillie, Ted Park, and Norman Jesse, all of last year's freshmen squad, are expected to give needed strength to the varsity line.

### Ends Weak

McEwan is confronted by the task of developing an entirely new set of ends. Vic Wetzel and Frank Riggs will both be lost by graduation. Ted Pope and Tony Greer, lettermen, are not in school and probably will not be back in the fall. To strengthen the wing posts McEwan may make some shifts in his veteran material or may depend upon Woodward Archer, Lyle Harrington, and Albert Stein, regulars from the freshmen team.

Ira Woodie, a two year letterman, is the leading candidate for quarterback with Choppie Parks of the yearling team held in reserve. Woodie is an accurate passer and a dependable punter.

### Veteran Backs

George Burnell, Arthur Ord, Dave Mason, and Bobby Robinson are the lettermen halfbacks. Cecil Gabriel, half back on the 1926 yearling team, is back in school, and with John Donohue of last season's frosh is expected to furnish the experienced men some stiff competition.

Chuck Williams, although not in school at the present time, is expected to be back to fill the full back position. Williams, however, is by no means a certainty for the job for both Cotter Gould, letterman, and Kitzmiller, from the yearling team, will be candidates.

## Committee for O. S. C. Play Day Is Appointed

Dorothea Lensch was appointed chairman of the committee for this year's annual Play Day with Oregon State College. The date has not yet been decided on by the Women's Athletic association, which sponsors the meet. Naomi Mosher, and Arroy, Marinette, and other members of the committee.

### Highlights Given

Esther Hardy gave some of the highlights of the accomplishments of the League this year to be the conducting of a vocational research among the women graduates of the University of Oregon class of '24 under the direction of Katherine Knerland. The selling of tickets for the student lecture series was also conducted for the first time this year by the League under the direction of Harriet Atchison. The scale netted the League \$66.50 which was used to bring Dr. Anita Muhl, psychiatrist from California to the campus as a part of the vocational guidance program.

The League was also active in the meeting of the State Association of Girls' Leagues during the High School conference, initiated a plan of selling grade envelopes to benefit the new student infirmary, cooperated with the Federated Women's clubs by supplying information regarding campus health work, and is now planning a handbook in order that campus regulations may be presented to entering women students during the summer.
