Seven Home Runs Made As Webfoots Down Columbia U

Jack Benefiel, graduate manager, had company yesterday. About three o'clock in the afternoon when Oregon's checker on the student body coffers was busy in his office, in walked a Mr. Gene Murphey and 14 stalwart Columbia University baseball players all ready for a game. It all caught our Mr. Benefiel unawares. In fact, it almost staggered the Mr. Benefiel, who is reputed to get everything he wants at a Pacific coast conference meeting. Here he was in a sad predicament—a baseball team already in Eugene to play a contest that had had no publicity.

For the last two days Benefiel had been negotiating by telegraph with the Columbia University officials. An endeavor to re-schedule the two postponed games with Columbia caused a mix-up. Anyway, the Oregon varsity met the Cliffdwellers

before a small crowd yesterday afternoon.

Many Home Runs Featured

It is a shame that the audience was so small. Nothing is more interesting to the average baseball fan than home runs and plenty of hits. Home runs were the feature of Oregon's 15 to 7 win over Columbia. Seven of them only added more interest to the contest which saw 29 safe bingles fly to all parts of Reinhart diamond.

W. James (Chick) Gannon took up the pitching burden for the Webfoots at the beginning of Mr. Benefiel's surprise party. He allowed 14 safe hits but kept them well scattered and the visiting Catholic nine could make them count for only seven runs. Mr. Gannon's right flipper was slightly sore at the start of the contest and by the ninth it evidently caused him some pain. After holding the Portland team scoreless from the fourth inning, four safe hits gave them three counters in the ninth. At the plate Mr. Gannon's performance probably excelled that of the mound. In four trips to the rubber, he made them count for a quartet of runs. The first two times up he drew walks but garnered safe bingles on the next two.

Columbia Scores First

When everything seemed to be going good for Mr. Gannon or the two Columbia hurlers, Messrs. Ray Herman and Mike Henry, a home run would clear the bags. Home runs put Mr. Herman on the blink and Henry replaced him in the third.

Columbia drew blood in the first inning when Heenan drove out a four-base hit. The Webfoots, not to be outdone, scored three in their half of the first canto. Ridings singled and then Edwards and Epps each poled out home runs. A walk,

hit batter, double and two singles scored four for the varsity in the second.

With two out in the third Mike Henry, who had just replaced Herman on the mound for Columbia, walked Woodie and Gannon. Rabbit Robie's home run scored them all. Two home runs and a single scored three runs for the visitors in the third and fourth. Two singles in the fourth and a home run and single in the seventh scored four more for the varsity.

A belated ninth inning rally scored three for the Columbia base-batters when Fitzpatrick crashed out a triple, Smith, Downey and Sullivan singled.

Oregon will meet Columbia in a second game today at four o'clock. Art Schoeni, southpaw, will be on the hillock for the Webfoots.
