Chief Justice Rand Gets Lawyers' Vote Stating Confidence

(By United Press) PORTLAND, Ore., May 15-Multnomah county lawyers in secret balloting today voted overwhelming confidence in Chief Justice John L. Hill '31, Moorad '30, Rand, who was the subject of a re eent attack by George W. Joseph, Portland attorney.

In balloting for their endorsement of candidate for seats on the supreme court and Multnomah circuit court benches, the lawyers gave Rand 422 votes, Justice George Rossman, former Portland municipal and circuit court judge, 489, and Judge L. H. McMahan, of Marion county, only 157.

Multnomah county's voting ma hines were used in the "election." Bar associations of La Grande, Pendleton, Astoria, Eugene, Mc-Minnville, Bend, and other cities had already adopted resolutions in which the character of the chief justice was declared above reproach.
