> The Webfoot grid team, with more hope for victory against Washington than for several seasons, leaves this morning at 8:00 o'clock for Portland, Oregon is eager and ready for the game on Multnomah field tomorrow afternoon

> Captain John J. McEwan's selection of the starting team after Wednesday's practice relieved the tension among the players. The workout Thursday night was only a light one, and climaxed a stern grind since the Stanford game.

The final practice was wholly different from those for two weeks back. The determined mood of the Webfooters was still there, but the grim scowls had vanished. Instead of the fierce drive of the days before, the Oregon players laughed and chattered throughout the practice as though they were going to Portland for a lark instead of a football



Three Fullbacks

The peculiarity of Oregon's backfield is the presence of three fullbacks in the line-up. Gould, Kitzmiller, and Williams were all alternating at full until Dave Mason, half, was injured, forcing McEwan to rearrange the combination. Kitzmiller, however, is not the conventional fullback type, and can play any of the backfield positions with the same degree of skill.

Kitzmiller, though only a sophomore, will be the center of the Oregon attack. He has the rare accomplishment of being a triple threat man. He punts, passes, and carries the ball with greater ability than evening the members and their any other backfield man developed by McEwan.
