

# Track Team Hurt By Flu; Two Men Out

## Hayward Must Bring More Runners, Says O. A. C.; Men Scarce

### C. Hill Elected as Captain; Squad Working Hard

Phi claims two of Bill Hayward's best cross-country runners, Ed Jensen and Bill Winter, who placed third and fourth in the tryout last week. One vacancy will be filled by John Runyan, and the other by Alfred Makinen, Roger Biswell, or Jack Creager.

O. A. C. persists in asking that Oregon bring more than 10 men Saturday. If Bill can't bring 20 men they want him to bring 15, or at least 12. Remembering an agreement he had made with O. A. C. coaches, Bill released a number of his men after the tryouts last week. These men are no longer in condition for a punishing grind through the mud, and with two of his best men down with the flu, Bill has barely 10 men on whom he can rely.

#### Hill Made Captain

Clarence Hill, of Klammath Falls, was elected captain of the team last night. Clarence is a senior in business administration and has earned two track letters. He came to school in 1925 with practically no running experience at all, but has since developed into one of the scrappiest distance runners on the coast. On the track team he is used in the two-mile, and sometimes in the mile events. Though regular track is his forte, Clarence says he prefers cross-country.

#### Hayward Optimistic

Mr. Hayward is not entirely pessimistic over the prospect of the meet. He says that what men he does have are very good, though many of them have had no experience. They have worked unusually hard this year, however, and Bill believes that unless the squad is further hit with sickness, they have a good chance to win.

Last night the team worked out over the full course, and finished up with some speed work on the track.

## Library To Receive Nineteen New Works By First of January

Nineteen new magazines on German, architecture, and geology will be added to the library by January 1, according to Ethel Casford, periodical librarian. There have also been several changes in old publications.

The "Outlook" and "Independent" have merged under the name of "Outlook and Independent," the first issue of which was October 24. The explanation for the union is the similarity of purpose already existing, as well as the like-mindedness of the men and women involved. The "Living Age" has also been revised, enlarged, and will be published monthly instead of weekly. President Arnold Bennett Hall of the university is a member of the advisory council directing the publication of this magazine.

"Personality," a magazine dealing chiefly with biography and enjoyed by a limited public, has been discontinued because of lack of financial support.

Most of the new architecture magazines are foreign, some of them being "Architectura et Arti Decorative," "Revista de Arquitectura," "Arquitectura," "L'Architecture," "Architect and Building News," and "Architect's Journal." The two German magazines are "Die Neue Rundschau" and "Deutsch-Nordische Zeitschrift."

## Oregon Professors' Articles Published In October Magazine

Exactly 32 of the 235 important pages of the October number of the Transactions of the American Mathematical society, which the library has just received, are taken up by articles written by members of the University of Oregon mathematics faculty.

Dr. D. R. Davis, an assistant professor in the department here, contributed "The Inverse Problem of the Calculus of Variations in Higher Space," which Edgar DeCon of the mathematics faculty says covers the work Dr. Davis did for his doctor's degree at the University of Chicago two years ago, as well as some research he has done since he came to Oregon.

The second article, written by Dr. W. E. Milne, now on a year's leave of absence, is entitled, "The Behavior of a Boundary Value Problem as the Interval Becomes Infinite."

The magazine, which appears quarterly, is the leading mathematical publication in America, Mr. DeCon says. Since only articles of major importance are recognized and published by the American Mathematical society, he considers it a great honor that the University of Oregon should be represented by two contributions to the current number.
