### Reinhart Has High Hopes For Conference Race

Daily practice for the varsity basketball squad will be inaugurated Monday by Coach Billy Reinhart when he will meet with the men in the Igloo at 5:00 o'clock. For the past two weeks the team has been working out tri-weekly as Billy has been busy with his freshman football men, but their season closes tonight when they meet the Reds.

During the early workouts the squad has been drilled in the fundamentals of pivoting, passing, dribbling, and offensive and defensive tactics. Starting next week more advanced work will be in order and scrimmages is soon to be started. The large squad is in good physical condition and every man has been working hard to make a good showing.

Seven lettermen from last year's runner-up squad are eligible for the coming season and all are working out regularly with the hoop squad. They are: Dave Epps, Joe Bally, Merv Chastain, Scott Milligan, Don McCormick, Gordon Ridings, and Ray Edwards. Among the newcomers showing good form are: Roy Hughes, Carl Eberhart, Gene Dousette and Reed Clark. These men are expected to give some of the veterans a race for their positions and plenty of competition for every place on the team is expected.

With a letterman for every position, Coach Reinhart believes the team will make a strong showing in the race for conference honors this winter. The biggest problem facing the varsity mentor is the developing of a center of conference calibre. However, he has a wealth of material out for practice and among these men there should be one who will fill the bill. Plenty of reserve strength is also assured Reinhart.

Several pre-season games will be played on the campus with visiting non-conference aggregations to enable the Webfoot team to polish up on their playing. There will be no barnstorming trip through the south this year as Billy thinks such a long trip would do more harm than good.

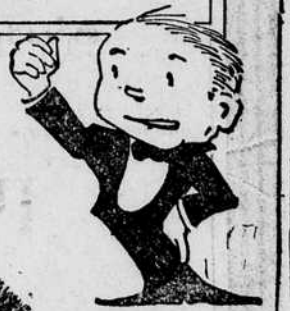
