# **Qualifications** Of Track Men Vary, Says Bill

Fighting Heart Essential To All Cinder Artists According to Hayward

Ability to Earn Letters Said To Change With Seasons

"Track men," said Bill Hayward yesterday, "are like diamonds. They come in all shapes and sizes. I've seen big milers and little milers; big shot-putters and little shot-putters. Sometimes the best men are bow-legged, and sometimes they are knockkneed. You can't tell a thing about it until your man has developed himself fully. But there is one thing which all track men must have, and that is a fighting heart!"

There are a few exterior characteristics which give some hint as to an individual's track capabilities, though the rules which these characteristics are supposed to illustrate have been violated so often that they have nearly become exceptions instead of rules. On a whole, according to Bill Hayward, distance men have slight builds, quarter-milers are rangy, sprinters are between these two, hurdlers are tall, broadjumpers are like sprinters but sometimes shorter, high-jumpers are thin and tall, weight-men are rather tall and stocky, and pole-vaulters are tall and strong.

Legs Only Necessity

Bill declares that it is possible to make a track man out of any one if he has two legs.

"Any man, I don't care who he is, or how bad he is at first," said Bill, "is practically certain of making his letter if he will come out four

Last year nine letters were awarded in track, and there were chances for twice that many letters. If a man wins six points during the season, or one first in any one dual conference meet, or one point in the Northwest conference meet, he is entitled to the Oregon emblem.

Chances for making points in the different events vary each year and in each meet. It all depends on the schedule, and on the relative strength of the teams competing.

In normal seasons, there is usually some one meet in which the weakest man has his opportunity. It is to win a letter, declares Bill. Yesterday he listed some of the performances with which it would be possible to win firsts. It is something like this: Many Events

Mile, 4 minutes 35 seconds; twomile, 10 minutes; half-mile, around 2 minutes; 440 yards, around 52 seconds; 220 yards, around 23 seconds; 100 yards, around 10 and twofifths seconds; 220 low hurdles, 27 seconds; 120 yard high-hurdles, 17 seconds; pole-vault, around 11 feet 6 inches; high jump, 5 feet 8 or 10 inches; shot-put, 43 feet; broadjump, 22 feet; discus, 125 feet; and javelin, 170 feet.

Bill says he has seen the shot-put won at 38 feet, the high-jump at 5 feet 4 inches, the pole-vault at under 11 feet, and the mile in 4 minutes and 40 seconds. It is not necessary to win firsts to qualify. Sometimes men combine more than one event in their work, and take enough seconds and thirds to give them the needed points. Sprinters often are good with the javelin, and discus men are usually good with the shot.


The only events which really require high, delicate coordination and therefore a little more experience than others are pole-vaulting and hurdling.
