

Oregon To Meet Northwestern U. Swimming Stars

Chicago University Team Will Swim Varsity if Finance Group Agrees

Arrangement of a swimming meet between Northwestern university, of Chicago, and the University of Oregon is in prospect as a result of communications exchanged by Edward Abernethy, swimming coach here, and H. L. Wilson, director of athletics at the Illinois school. Northwestern is sending a swimming team on a national tour sometime in February. If the Oregon student finance committee approves of plans the travelers will stop at Eugene for the proposed meet. The date set will probably be between February 11 to 16, providing negotiations are completed.

Northwestern university has one of the most powerful and colorful swimming teams in the country, according to Coach Abernethy. Members of the team include: Al Schwartz, national collegiate record holder of the 100 and 220-yard short course free style events; Dick Huick, national intercollegiate back stroke champion in the 150-yard distance; Wallie Gelbath, diver on the U. S. Olympic team in 1928; and Eddie Lennox, a former team mate of Johnny Anderson, varsity swimmer, at Mercersburg academy.

Huick won the backstroke race at the nationals last year in which Anderson placed fourth. Lennox, Anderson and Eddie Cahell, Yale swimmer, were joint holders of the national interscholastic medley relay record while the three were at Mercersburg in 1926.

Tentative dates with the University of California and with U. C. L. A. have been arranged, according to Abernethy. This makes four California schools with which Oregon will compete in swimming. The Webfoot aquatic team will leave Eugene February 16 or 17 and meet California the 19th, Stanford the 20th, U. S. C. on the 22nd and U. C. L. A. on the 23rd. The second meet with O. S. C., previously announced for March 4 will be held on the 2nd.

Other nations joined in and the fighting was spread over a very large territory, with Turkey also a center of operations.

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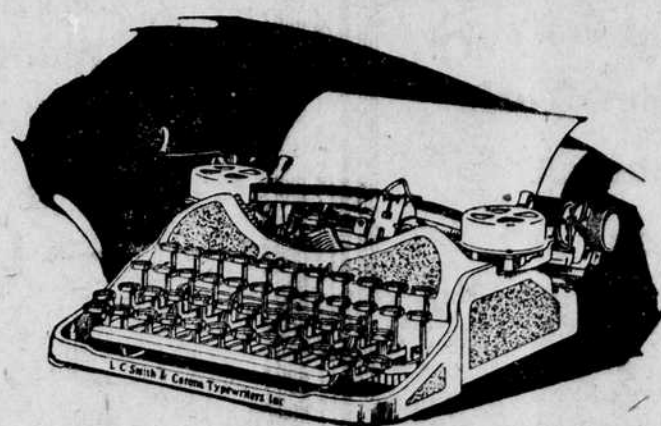
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
