California Asks Date Before Oregon Puts Its Teams on Field

Track Coach Invents New Shoes for Indoor Use

A strange request has come to Bill Hayward from the University of California. That school wants to schedule a track meet at Berkeley with the University of Oregon on March 23.

March 23 is mid-season for California. Even now their intramural track season is about over. Not until April 13, with the tryouts for the O. S. C. relays being held here on that date, does the regular Oregon track season commence. From that time on, the Oregon schedule is completely filled; so it is very improbable that California and Oregon will match strides and tapes this year.

Difficult though it would be to send even a semblance of a track team to California this year on March 23, such a thing would have been entirely out of the question a couple of years ago. Then there was no McArthur court indoor training system, and the only answer that could have been made would have been in form of the old bad weather alibi. Now the answer will be: "Wait a while, and we'll put teams on the field as early as you do."

Await Special "Kicks"

All that is holding up the training work in McArthur court at present is a delayed shipment of 100 pairs of indoor track shoes. These shoes were invented by Bill Hayward, and are such an improvement over the old style, upon which they are based, and have drawn so much favorable comment from coaches throughout the country, that a large eastern rubber company remodeled a whole section of their plant in order to manufacture them. The upper part of the shoe is like that of an ordinary spiked track shoe, while the special tread is of rubber.

The first intramural meet will be held early in February, and every man on the campus who does not own a track letter is qualified to enter. Besides the intramural contests, varsity-fresh meets are also on the tentative indoor program.

It is possible to hold every track and field event excepting the javelin and discus in McArthur court, so ingeniously has Bill Hayward worked out his indoor system.

Track men have been working out of doors since the beginning of the term whenever the ground on Hayward field was firm enough, the only inside work being rope-skipping and using the chest machines, but there has been a general lay-off the last few days on account of the condition in which the freezing and thawing has left the track.

Track Men Work Out

On January 31, a week from Thursday, at 7:15 p. m., Coach Hayward will speak from the Portland radio station KGW. His subject will be on the Olympic games, and on track in general. For many years Hayward has been a United States Olympic team coach.

Phi Delta Theta in Lead With Total of \$21

About one-third of its quota of \$1,000 was raised by the Y. M. C. A. in the drive which was recently conducted in connection with the campus chest.

Few of the men's houses gave as much as last year, Phi Delta Theta leading with a contribution of \$21. On the average the independent men gave a little more generously than the fraternity men did.

Early Fee Payment Is Cry of Cashier

Pay your fees early is again the cry of the cashier's office. Laboratory, syllabus fees, class fees or special assessments are due and payable between the dates of January 23 and February 2. During this time the cashier's office in Johnson hall will be open in the morning from 8 until 12 and in the afternoon from 1 until 4, except on Saturday when the office closes at noon.

After February 2, \$3.00 will be added to the fees for the first late day and 25c will be added for every subsequent day. Students are also urged by the cashier, E. P. Lyon, to remember that N. S. F. checks place the student in the same position as though he had not paid his fees and subject him to the late payment of fees penalty. Checks will not be accepted from students who have previously written N. S. F. checks.

"I want to urge students to come in and pay their fees early," Mr. Lyon said. "Ordinarily they wait until the last few days when the hurry and congestion makes it hard for the students to pay their fees and hard for the office to handle the work."

Oregon Professors Tell How They Earned First Real Money

"My first real job was selling law book annotations to lawyers throughout the state of Wisconsin," stated Dean Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism.

These annotations, Dean Allen explained, were used by the lawyers for the purpose of keeping their law books up to date, serving as a sort of index of the legislation in relation to certain statutes.

American Women May Enroll in English School

Oxford University Offers Advanced Degree Work; Societies Save Places

The dean of women's office has just received material from Oxford university in England giving information with regard to the admission of American women students to Oxford.

The capacity for women students at Oxford is very limited, but American students may be admitted. The principals of the five Oxford women's societies will reserve a certain number of places for American women graduate students, and will fill these on the basis of recommendation of the American committee, which will receive applications at the national offices of the American association of university women. It is also possible for American women to apply for admission to Oxford as undergraduates in the usual way, taking entrance examinations and

standing their chances with the British candidates and those from other countries.

Local Specialist First On Coast To Use X-Ray

The first man to have an X-ray picture taken on the Pacific coast is Dr. J. R. Wetherbee, eye, ear, and nose specialist of Eugene.

Mr. Wetherbee has a crooked finger, and while he was a student here, in 1895, he hooked up a Crooke's tube, a vacuum tube such as is used for experiments now, to an induction coil and a dynamo; then held his finger between the tube and photographic plate. It took a half an hour to take the picture, whereas now it takes less than half a minute.

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
