### Dr. Huestis to Speak To Psychology Club

#### Heredity and Environment In Biology to Be Topic

Dr. R. R. Huestis, professor of animal biology, will address the Psychology club at its next regular meeting Wednesday, February 20, at 7:30 in the men's room of the Woman's building.

Dr. Huestis' subject will be "Biological Characters as Determined by Hereditary and Environmental Factors." The meeting will be open to all psychology majors, as well as graduate students and faculty members of the department.

The following meeting, to be held on Wednesday, March 6, will be a discussion of hereditary and environmental determination of intelligence. Dr. H. R. Taylor, assistant professor of psychology, will give a summary and review of the recent yearbook of the National Society for the Study of Education.

Dr. A. R. Moore, head of the department of animal biology, will discuss the nature of the nervous impulse and inhibition, at a meeting in the near future.

### Scarlet Fever on Campus Halts March With 3 Still Sick

With no addition to the three scarlet fever victims reported at the infirmary yesterday, health authorities were agreed that likelihood of an epidemic is slight. The condition of the three ill of the disease is satisfactory, they said. Precautionary measures, principally gargling, are advised by authorities, and any who have an inclination to a sore throat or nausea, common symptoms of scarlet fever, are asked to report immediately at the dispensary for examination.

A musical program by university students will precede the talks. Before the introduction of the main speaker, Wilderman will give the sports program for the past and coming week.

### Cinema Tryouts Held; 75 Embryo Actors Show Up

Grease paint, ghastly pink and brown lumps of it, came on and off, slim arched eyebrows appeared and disappeared, the camera twirled and then rested—all while 75 University of Oregon students made their debut to movies yesterday afternoon for two hours during screen tests for the campus movie at the Igloo. Twice as many men as women tried out.

Tests will continue all day today, beginning at nine o'clock in the morning when Renee Nelson and her staff of makeup slingers, who claim they grow more dexterous at wielding the sticky stuff with each "patient," and Wilson Jewett head cameraman, and his staff of grinders will be on deck ready for a full day of it.

For those students who are off the campus for the week end some tests will be given from three until five o'clock Monday afternoon at the Igloo, announced Arlen McCarty, director of screen tests, last night. Things went off with all the speed and enthusiasm of a Saturday afternoon hard-riding western in the first lap of the tests, he said.

At luncheon and dinner yesterday men and women visited every living group on the campus, announcing tests and urging 100 per cent turnouts.

"We want to remind the students again that everyone who has a test will appear in the movie and that everything about the tryout is private, including the showing afterward," added McCarty.

### Parsons Explains Remodeling Work In Social School

#### New Courses to Be Added To Curriculum; Survey Of State Life Planned

Reorganization of the school of sociology along lines which will make it a school of applied social science will be effected soon, it was announced Thursday by Dean Philip A. Parsons at a meeting of Alpha Kappa Delta, honorary sociology fraternity.

New courses embodying community organization, a course in training for students wishing to be deans of men or women and in social research will be included in the school of sociology curriculum next term, Dr. Parsons announced.

It will be possible for students to major in social work at the University of Oregon in the future. They will be aided by the \$400,000 gift of the Rockefeller foundation to the university for the erection of a new medical clinic in Portland. This building will be available also for the headquarters of the social welfare bureau.

Projected welfare research was outlined by Dr. Parsons. A bill for \$30,000 a year for five years is before the state legislature, and if it is passed the money will be used for a state-wide survey, beginning with the behavior of school children and following their actions through life.

Included in this survey will be a study of the state and its people, climate, resources, life and labor of people and the general condition and well-being of the people, the way they keep themselves alive, the functioning of government, a survey of crime, education and religion.
