

Babes Send Frosh Home With Defeat

Yearlings Have Four Defeats and One Win For Season Scores

Final Contest Slated With Huskies Here on Friday

The frosh basketball team lost its fourth game in five starts when the University of Washington babes defeated them, 28 to 20, at Seattle last Saturday. A return game will be played this Friday at McArthur court preliminary to the Oregon-Washington conference tilt.

This defeat at the hands of the babes practically puts the freshman team down as a losing team for this season. After starting out the year by winning all their practice games they let the Aggie rooks take three of the four contests played. They still had a chance of redeeming themselves by conquering the northern freshmen, but that chance was lost last Saturday.

Frosh Ahead at Half
These Oregon yearlings have the habit of winning their games in the first half and then throwing them away in the last part of the game. The last two contests with the rooks at Eugene were examples of this. The Webfoot yearlings led in both only to drop behind in the last few minutes.

At Washington last week they were ahead 15 to 13, at half time, but let the babes walk away from them to win by eight points. Oregon scored only two field goals in the second period.

Not Playing Their Best
The freshmen were not the poorer team, but did not play their best, according to Spike Leslie, frosh coach. They played a fairly good defensive game at first, but later in the game they let up and their play was very ragged in all ways.

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Frosh Swimming Team Troupes O. S. C. Rooks

Oregon Natators Triumph Over Aggies by 38-25; 160-Yard Relay Is Close

The Oregon frosh swimming team defeated the Oregon State rooks, 38-25, in a dual meet last Saturday at Corvallis. The frosh took six first places, not counting a victory in the 100-yard breast stroke which was disallowed. The rooks placed first in the fancy diving, took three seconds and were ceded five points for placing in the breast stroke.

The first event was the closest race of the meet. Lafferty, Torrey, Hansen, and Pratt, the freshman 160-yard free style relay team, nosed out the rook relay men by scarcely three feet. Paul Lafferty, first man in the relay, also swam and placed first in the next event, the 100-yard breast stroke. Judges at the meet declared both Lafferty and Brad Datson, freshman breast stroke, disqualified because they did not turn properly at the ends of the pool. Lillie, rook who placed third, was awarded first in the event.

Times in the meet were very slow, several being five or more seconds away from record time. Al Edwards swam the 50-yard free style in 27 seconds and Dick Torrey won the 150-yard back stroke with a time of 2:03 4/5 for the fastest clockings of the contest.

In the dives, Sigenthaler of the rooks, defeated Howard Dirks, freshman, by a mere three point margin. Chefman of the rooks was third.
