

Hayward Sees Good Cinder Path Success

We'll Balanced Squad Coming Up; Movie Takes a Few

Clarence Hill in Condition; Leg Now Healed

Oregon track prospects are better this year than at any time during the last five seasons, according to Bill Hayward, varsity track coach. The stars of the cinder path reported for the first practice of the spring term last night, and Hayward put the men through a strenuous conditioning drill. Many of the runners have been working out all winter and will round into shape in little time.

Few New Prospects

No outstanding varsity prospects were uncovered in the intramural meet held last term, but Hayward expects to put a well balanced team in the field this season. The varsity mentor complained that two or three of his veteran performers have forsaken the squad for work in the campus movie, but these men will be replaced by more willing workers.

Prospects were brightened with the return to school of Clarence Hill, cross country runner, and Marion Hall, weight tosser. Hill broke his leg while running in the annual cross country meet at Corvallis last fall but declared that it is completely healed. He has been exercising on skis and snow shoes during the winter months. If he is in good shape, Oregon will boast of a strong list of entries in the two mile event.

Weak in Hurdles

The only weak spot, at present, on the varsity is in the hurdles.

Two veterans of last year, Bill Crawford, a two-striper, and Harold Kelley are in school, but Crawford has been inconsistent in practice and few men have showed promise of attaining varsity form to run with Kelley.

Coach Hayward will attend the Washington-Stanford dual meet at Seattle Thursday to get a line on the Huskies. Bill is confident of making a good showing against all competition this season, but remarked on advanced condition of the Huskies, due to remarkable track facilities in their field house. All events in the Husky-Cardinal meet, with the exception of the discus throw and javelin throw will be held in the field house. These two events will be staged outdoors.

Movie 'Story of Steel' To Be Shown Tonight

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Mrs. Davis Quits Job as Director Of Campus Halls

Oregon Woman to Hold Similar Position at Pomona College

Was Eleven Years Matron Of Local Dormitories

Mrs. Henry W. Davis, director of the halls of residence on the campus, will leave the university at the end of this year to take a similar position at Pomona college of Claremont, California, according to a recent announcement.

Mrs. Davis, who has been on the campus for 16 years, inherited the job as matron at Friendly hall from her mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Prescott, 11 years ago.

At that time Mrs. Davis was in charge of 60 men at Friendly hall and 22 girls at Mary Spiller hall. When Hendricks hall was built in 1917 and Susan Campbell in 1920, Mrs. Davis took charge of their kitchens. Now with the addition of the new men's dorm, she supervises the preparation of food for 750 students.

At Pomona college, which is a co-educational school limited to 800 students, Mrs. Davis will have

charge of a men's dorm to be erected soon.

Mr. and Mrs. Davis, accompanied by Mrs. Davis' mother, drove to Pomona spring vacation to look the proposition over, and Mrs. Davis will return to Claremont on April 8 to assist in choosing furnishings for the new dormitory.

Mr. Davis, who recently resigned as director of the United Christian work on the campus, has not yet definitely decided on his work; but he probably will do some student work in a southern California school.

Mr. and Mrs. Davis intend to retain their home on College Crest and spend part of their summers in Eugene.

The playing schedule has not yet been completed, but early practice games will be arranged with high school teams. Sliding and hitting will be stressed until warmer weather.

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
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
