

Track Team Will Select Its Captain

Meeting Slated Today For Election of 1929 Leader

Two Seattle Trips Planned For Webfoot Squad

Hayward field presents a busy scene, these afternoons, with a large squad of varsity trackmen working out under the watchful eyes of Bill Hayward, veteran coach. Few lettermen are in school, but Hayward has developed several promising men and he is confident that Oregon will make a creditable showing against all opponents this year.

Training table has been inaugurated and the men are observing strict training rules. A meeting of all track lettermen will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon, to elect a captain of the team. Coach Hayward declared last night that he is in favor of retaining the captain system in track, stating that a real leader is an asset to any team.

Hayward Helps Proteges

The practice period last night was largely spent in starting drill. Coach Hayward worked with the men individually, showing them weaknesses they should overcome. Short runs were held, with the men running at three-quarters speed, to thoroughly loosen up any stiff muscles.

The field men worked on perfecting their form, and big Homer Dickson showed well in the javelin throw. Oregon should present a formidable array of weight men this year, with Dickson, Ed Mueller, and George Stager entered in the events.

The complete track schedule, as released by Coach Hayward, included dual meets with Washington and Oregon Aggies, relay meets with the same schools, and the Pacific Northwest meet, to be held in Eugene May 31 and June 1. The Webfoots will travel to Seattle twice and Corvallis once during the season.

Tryouts for all events will be held on April 13, with the tryouts for the O. A. C. relays on April 20. Coach Hayward expects to have his squad in good shape by that time and several of the men are expected to turn in good performances.

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Hamaker Names Participants for Annual Festival

Pairing of Houses for Canoe Fete Slated For Tomorrow

Chairman Urges Entrants To Start Work Soon

The men's and women's houses who will participate in this year's Canoe Fete were announced last night by Kenton Hamaker, general chairman of the committee in charge. The lottery which will pair the houses will be held on the library steps Thursday morning at 11 o'clock.

The men's houses which will be represented in the entering fifteen floats in the Fete will be: Alpha Upsilon, Gamma hall, Psi Kappa, Sigma Nu, Delta Epsilon, Zeta hall, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Alpha Tau Omega, Sherry Ross hall, Theta Chi, Chi Psi, Phi Gamma Delta, Kappa Sigma, Friendly hall, and Sigma Chi.

The women's houses which will be paired with these fraternities are: Kappa Kappa Gamma, Alpha Gamma Delta, Phi Mu, Kappa Delta, Sigma Kappa, Gamma Nu, Oregon club, Three Arts club, Kappa Alpha Theta, Alpha Omicron Pi, Gamma Phi Beta, Delta Gamma, Alpha Phi, Susan Campbell hall, and Alpha Chi Omega.

The houses to participate in the Fete were determined by a permanent system of rotation which was established by last year's directorate. At that time each men's and each women's house on the campus was assigned a permanent number. The first fifteen on each list participated in last year's Fete, and the remainder, with some of those who entered last year, will take part again this year.

The lottery which will decide the pairing of the houses will be held on the library steps Thursday morning under the direction of Jeanette Gunther. The fraternity and sorority numbers will be placed in separate hats. The two houses whose numbers are drawn from the hats at the same time will be paired for the Fete.

The houses which are taking part in the affair this year should appoint their committees immediately, Hamaker said, so that work on the floats may begin as soon as the pairings are announced. The rules will be the same as last year. Each float is limited to \$30 cost. Two permanent cups, now in the possession of Hendricks hall and Bachelordon, last year's winners, will be awarded this year to the winning houses, and \$50 in merchandise will

be distributed among the winners and runners up as well.

New Constitution For Order of 'O' Drawn up by Trio

Committee to Present It At Meeting Called for All Members Today

A new constitution will be presented to the Order of the "O" for adoption at a meeting of the organization tomorrow morning at 11:00 o'clock. A constitutional committee of three, Bill Adams, chairman, Loye McGee and Bill Baker, have been working since the middle of February to formulate the document.

The work of the committee, said Adams, was to perfect a beneficial organization among the lettermen which will have a constructive purpose on the University of Oregon campus. At present the members of the Order of the "O" feel that there is no concrete aim in the workings of the group as a whole.

A resolution drawn up by the committee will be submitted to the organization along with the constitution. In the resolution it is declared that the purpose of the Order of the "O" should be to promote sportsmanship on the campus and to develop a feeling of loyalty toward the university. The committee will urge the encouragement of high school athletes to attend the university, to establish and maintain to best advantage the physical, social and educational interest of the members of the organization.

The constitution contains many clauses, said Adams, which if adopted, will rejuvenate and improve the Order of the "O." Les Johnson, president of the group, has urged that all lettermen attend the meeting at the men's gymnasium tomorrow.

Thacher Cottage Will Close; No New Patients

Thacher cottage probably will be closed this week if there are no more cases of measles on the campus, according to Dr. Romig, university physician.

There are now only two patients in the cottage, James Manning, admitted on March 9 and now convalescing from scarlet fever, and Gordon Gardner, admitted on March 31 with measles. Those now in the infirmary are Marie Koberstein, James Hind, Fletcher Udall, Rita Harriman and Virgil La Clair.

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
