

Intramural Water Polo Starts Today

Three Games Scheduled For Soft-ball League In Men's Gym

A.T.O. Meets S.A.E., First Match; Others Follow

The intramural water polo season will formally be opened at 4:30 this afternoon in the men's gymnasium tank when the A. T. O. splashes will clash with the S. A. E. paddlers. At 5 o'clock Delta Epsilon will meet Phi Sigma Kappa, and at 7 o'clock Sigma Nu will meet Phi Delta Theta. All these games will be played under the inter-collegiate soft ball rules.

On Thursday the international league, which plays hard-ball polo, will play at 4:30 p. m. when Beta Theta Pi meets the Independents. At 5 p. m. the same day Phi Kappa Psi will meet Phi Gamma Delta, and at 7 p. m. Phi Sigma Kappa will meet A. T. O., and immediately following Kappa Sigma will meet Sigma Nu.

The varsity hard ball teams will also compete today and Thursday afternoons, the games being called at 4 p. m. in the men's gym tank. Today Captain Frank Walton's Whites, playing the second game of the series, will meet Captain MacGowan Miller's Reds. Last Tuesday Walton's team beat Miller's 8 to 4. At 4 p. m. on Thursday Captain Chet Floyd's Blues will meet the Whites.

Eugene High School Takes Second; Ten Entered

The state high school drama tournament, which was held on the campus Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of last week, was a surprisingly great success, according to those university authorities connected with it. Mrs. Ottilie T. Seybolt, head of the drama department, expressed her highest satisfaction with the results, saying that she was confident that the high interest would be sustained.

Milwaukie Union high school received the Guild theater cup Saturday night for its presentation of "The Valiant." Eugene high school took first honorable mention with "Op-o-Me-Thumb," and Henley

won second honorable mention with "Joint Owners in Spain."

Surprise came with the presentation of a new award in the shape of a small replica of the Guild theater cup. It was offered by Dean Collins, dramatic critic of the Portland Telegram, to the best individual actor of the entire tourney. Wilma Dawson, of Henley high, received this cup for her excellent portrayal of Mrs. Dyer, in "Joint Owners in Spain." First honorable mention under this award was given to Howard Steib, Milwaukie high, who took the part of James Dyke in "The Valiant." Second honorable mention went to Willis Eklad for his portrayal of the Presence in "Dust of the Road."

Many more schools applied for ad-

mission in the tournament this year than could be accommodated, since ten was the limit.

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
