Here's a short story tragedy told in verse. More than that, it's one of the starkest tragedies ever, and it consists of some of the most peculiar and most effective verse ever. It's the story of Pansy, a negro boxer, who had climbed so high and was so good that the champion wouldn't fight him. Then it was discovered that Pansy had, in the course of his various travels, most naively acquired three wives: that put an end to anything but fighting with jail guards. When he was finally freed it was

thought that his boxing days were over, and he was paired with another fighter as a setup. The description of that fight and its aftermath composes the largest part of the book.

March's style is so terse and compact that the reader is almost immediately transported into the ring, taking and giving with the fighters.

The words fairly knock you off your feet, and the last line is literally a knockout.




