

Junior Day Plans Near Completion

Annual Event to Begin Here Three Weeks From Today

New Features to Be Added To Campus Program

Three weeks from today Junior Week-end, the big event of the year, will open on the Oregon campus. A lot of work remains to be done by the hard-working Junior Week-end directors, headed by Sid Dobbin, the myriad of sub-directors, and the still greater number of sub-committees who are laboring to make the week-end a success.

But enough of the work has been already completed, and a sufficient number of plans have been definitely made and approved so that the events of this year's celebration can be quite clearly visualized.

Vodvil in Two Weeks

The first event of the week-end, or rather the forerunner, is the Junior Vodvil, which will be presented at the Heilig theater on the nights of May 3 and 4 and on the afternoon of May 4. "Oh Dear," a musical comedy, is being produced this year by a staff under the general direction of Paul Hunt. The play was written by Don Johnston and Boone Hendricks, and is being directed by them. Virginia Moore is in charge of the training of the choruses, and Bob Warner is directing the specialty acts of the production.

The rehearsal of some part of the comedy is held every day, and a complete rehearsal of the entire production was held at the Heilig Tuesday afternoon. The scenery and the costumes have been ordered. It is expected that the work on the play, except for a few finishing touches, will be perfected by the end of next week.

New Events Promised

The traditional events of campus day, with a number of new and original ones added, will begin on the morning of May 10 under the direction of Jim Sharp. A holiday

will be held on the campus that day. In the morning will be held the annual painting of the "O" on Skinner's butte by the members of the freshman football team, the tug of war between the freshmen and the sophomores on Kincaid field, and the burning of the green lids of the yearlings.

Campus Luncheon Friday

At noon Friday the annual campus luncheon, of which Eldress Judd is the head, will be held on the campus in front of Friendly hall. The details of the feed will be announced later.

During the luncheon hour the orchestra will furnish music and the Order of the "O" will furnish a special series of events in the vicinity of the fountain between the library and Deady hall. The principal feature of the afternoon will be a baseball game between the University of Oregon and the University of Washington. Friday evening at 7 o'clock a water polo game will be held between the varsity teams of the university and O.S. C. in the pool in the men's gym. This will be the first inter-collegiate water polo match to be held in the Northwest. The polo game will be over in time for the Canoe Fete.

Fete Big Event

The Canoe Fete is probably the biggest event of the Week-end. It will be held Friday night on the mill race under the direction of Kanton Hamaker, general chairman. Fourteen floats will be entered in competition by 28 of the living organizations of the campus for two permanent cups, as well as other prizes.

Saturday morning will be devoted to a tennis game with Washington at 10 o'clock, which will probably decide the championship of the Pacific northwest, and a water carnival which will be given on the mill race under the direction of Sharp. This will be the first such event ever to be presented here. A second baseball game with Washington will be played Saturday afternoon.

Prom Ends Celebration

The final event of the week-end will be the Junior Prom Saturday night. The prom is probably the biggest dance held on the campus during the school year. It will be given at McArthur court. Crosby Owens is in charge of this affair. He has a staff at work on the plans and will announce the motif of the decorations within a short time.

The second annual Mother's Day will be held on the campus in connection with Junior Week-end. Eleanor Poorman, who is in charge of the day, has planned a number of special events for the mothers, such as a tea and a banquet, in addition to the regular week-end events. The debate on the campus starts promptly at 7 o'clock in room 107 Villard.

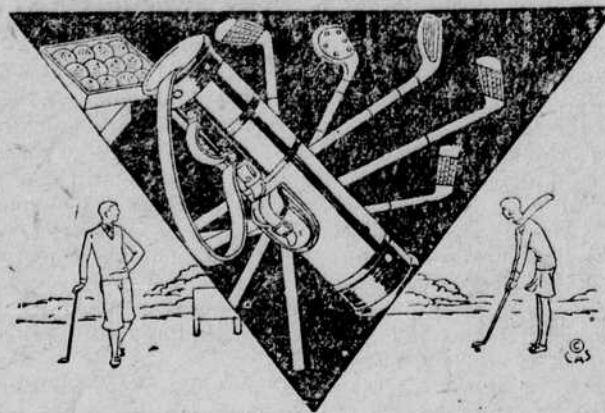
Next Monday night Miss Klemm and Miss Leach will meet the University of Washington at Seattle again on the negative of the same question.

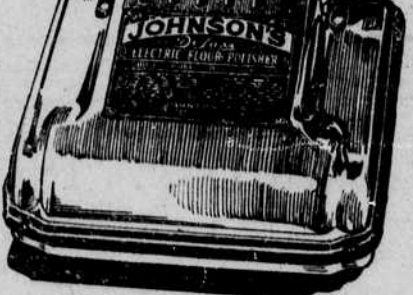
