Both Oregon and O. S. C. lost to Bill Reinhart Meiji university


this week, but the Aggies took the worst beating. The Japanese won 13 to 8 from the Staters and edged out Oregon 1 to 0.

John Anderson and Tom Stoddard will head the two tickets for presidency, while Dick Horn, Harold Kelley, and Walt Norblad will vie for the vicepresidency.

The office of secretary attracted LaWanda Fenlason and Beatrice Milligan. Florence McNerney and Naomi Moshberger will compete for senior woman and James Dezendorf and Rex Tussing for junior man on the executive council. Either Chuck


Reed or Jim Swindells will be the student body's next yell leader.

An amendment was read by Joe McKeown, student body president, to be voted on at the regular eleetion, May 1, proposing an additional fee of 25 cents per term for lecture series, the amount to be expended by a budget drawn up by the leeture series committee and passed on by the executive committee. The by-laws to the constitution giving the publications committee, subject to the executive council, power of making awards for work of Emerald and Oregana editors, managers and staff, passed without a dissenting vote.

Stoddard Nominated


