## Yearling Track Squad to Compete With O.S.C. Rooks

### Time Trials Held Monday To Select Men for Fresh Team

The Oregon frosh will compete with the O. S. C. rooks in five relay events on Hayward field Thursday afternoon at three o'clock. Time trials were held yesterday to select men for the frosh team.

The five men to be used in the short sprints are Paul Bale, Virgil Scheiber, Hubert Alle, Neil Whistman, and Bill Minsinger. The 220 tryouts will be held this afternoon.

Five men were picked for the 440-yard distance. They are Raymond Nereau, Roy Brown, Ruff Johnson, and Friley. The best time made in the quarter-mile tryout yesterday was 55 seconds.

Dick Jennings was the only frosh entered in the half mile. He ran against time and was clocked at 2:26. Clifford Beckett took the mile in the time of 4:56, with Fred Beehill running second.

Coach Bill Hayward has not decided on the arrangement of the men on the teams. Four men will run 110 yards each in the 440-yard relay, four will run quarters in the mile relay, and four will run 220 yards each in the 880-yard relay. In the 3-mile relay, two half-milers and two milers will be used. A two-twenty man, a quarter-miler, a half-miler, and a miler will be used in the distance medley.
