

Belgian Band Arrives Today To Play Here

Will Present Program Both in Afternoon And Evening Makes First Tour of U. S.; Engaged With Difficulty

The Royal Belgian Band, composed of eighty members under the direction of Captain Arthur Prevost, will arrive at 1:50 this afternoon on a special train chartered from Oakland, California, and at 3 o'clock will present a program at McArthur court. Their program in the evening at 8:15 o'clock will again prove the versatility of this organization. Until the Belgian Band started to establish its unique European reputation, it was an unheard-of thing for a military band to attempt the performance of a symphony. But such is the high standard of musicianship among the eighty members of the band and so skillful is its conductor in arranging orchestral scores for band instrumentation that several classic symphonies are now a part of the regular repertoire.

Variety of Selections

Besides classic, among the two hundred works in the repertoire of the Symphonie Band, are to be found compositions, semi-classic and popular. Captain Prevost has taken a deep interest in the modern composers, and has himself arranged for his organization works by Ravel, Bela Bartok, Stravinsky, Respighi, Casella, Prokofiev, Milhaud and other contemporary writers. It was at Stravinsky's request that Captain Prevost arranged the difficult score of the "Petushka" ballet music.

Military marches are naturally included in the concerts of the band, and even in this department Captain Prevost has endeavored to present unusual and rarely heard pieces. This unusual band of the Royal Belgian Guards was founded in 1831 as a small company of musicians attached to the famous Regiment des Guides. It has been continuously in existence for nearly a century and has gradually grown to its present size.

Conducts for 14 Years

Captain Arthur Prevost has been the conductor for the last 14 years. He began the study of music when a child and was graduated with honors from the Conservatory of Brussels. Before assuming the direction of the band, he was well known as an excellent violinist.

The Royal Belgian Band is making its first tour of America, and it was only with difficulty, said Ronald Robnett, assistant graduate manager, that the Heilig and the university were able to secure two engagements here.

Virtually every state in the union and many provinces in Canada will be visited by the distinguished band, which was brought to this country by a special arrangement made with the Belgian government and King Albert of Belgium by the New York concert management, Gobue-Laberge.

Has Wide Tour

Following the spectacular opening night in the Metropolitan Opera house, New York, the band went to

Boston, Atlantic City, Philadelphia, Washington, Princeton, then up to Canada, where it played in Montreal, Quebec and other Canadian cities.

After playing several engagements in Chicago, the band went to Wichita, Cleveland, Detroit, St. Louis, and from thence came to the Pacific coast.

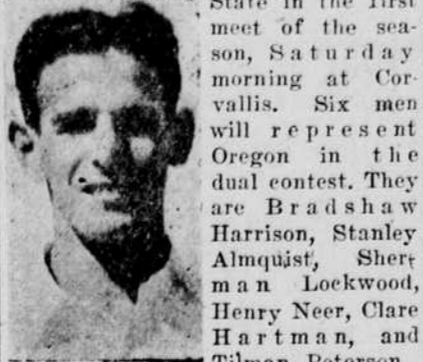
Varsity Tennis Men Meet O.S.C. Teams Saturday

First Season Game Set At Corvallis Courts; Ten Will Play

Frosh and Rook Matches Promise Action, Color

Oregon's varsity tennis team, predicted in pre-season reports as being a coast championship contender, will meet Oregon State in the first meet of the season, Saturday morning at Corvallis. Six men will represent Oregon in the dual contest. They are Bradshaw Harrison, Stanley Almquist, Sherman Lockwood, Henry Neer, Clare Hartman, and Tilman Peterson.

The Oregon freshmen and the Oregon State rooks will meet in a dual tournament Saturday afternoon. Four man teams will compete in the matches which are an annual event between the first year squads of the two schools.

Leading the Oregon varsity in its match will be Bradshaw Harrison, who ranks first among amateur tennis players on the coast. He holds the singles titles of Oregon, Washington, California, and British Columbia. This will be his first year of competition for Oregon.

Stanley Almquist, sophomore, will be second man for Oregon. He has been giving Harrison lots of competition for the post of first man and was for a short time last winter the university champion, defeating Harrison in a ladder tournament challenge match.

Sherman Lockwood, who was injured in an automobile accident last term, has recovered and will play third man on the varsity. He and Harrison hold the majority of

doubles titles in amateur tennis on the coast.

Henry Neer, two-year letterman, is fourth man on the team. He has been outstanding in competition, his most notable achievement being possession of the Pacific coast collegiate singles title in 1927. In 1928 he went east to the national collegiate singles matches.

Clare Hartman, letterman, and Tilman Peterson, last year's reserve player, will complete the six man team. Both won matches last year.

Strength of the Aggie team is unknown. It is not likely that they will offer much competition for Oregon, however.
