Two-game Series Will Be Monday and Tuesday

WASHINGTON STATE COL-LEGE, Pullman, May 3 .- (Special) -Washington State college will meet the University of Oregon in the first two of a four-game series at Eugene Monday and Tuesday. The third and fourth games will be played here later in the month.

Last year the Cougars won the championship of the eastern division and the Webfoots of the western. In one of the most sensational three-game series ever played at Eugene, the Oregon team won the third and final game when Don McCormick, Webfoot third baseman, hoisted one over the fence in the 10th inning.

McDowell to Start Eddie McDowell, Cougar star, probably will open against the Webfooters. McDowell is one of the best pitchers in the northwest and he hopes to have an opportunity to pitch against Reynold MacDonald, the ace of the Ducks.

Washington State started off poorly by dropping the first two games to Idaho, 9 to 10, and 8 to 11. The Cougars had plenty of fire at bat, but their pitchers lacked their last year's effectiveness, mainly beacuse of poor weather during the spring training.
