**Koyl, Gerlinger Cups Will Be Given at Annual Dance**

**More Help Is Needed By Decoration Committee, Says Chairman**

The Koyl and Gerlinger cups will be presented to the best all-around junior man and junior woman on the campus at the Prom Saturday night, according to Dean Creath, in charge of features for the occasion. Also several other features of the evening will be furnished by student talent of the campus.

The turnout for work on the decorations are very few this year, said Crosby Owens, chairman of the Prom committee.

**Owens Disappointed**

"We are greatly disappointed, especially in the junior men," Owens stated last night. "If they would only come out an hour a day it would help. Unless the junior men turn out the decorations will have to be cut to some extent. This is the biggest dance event of the year and we must stand back of it and support it."

Late permission has been granted the junior women by Dean Hazel Prutsman for from now until Saturday night to give the girls additional time to work on the decorations.

**Sunday Issue New Venture For Students; Paper Has 24 Pages**

Classes of the school of journalism took over the reins of all staff positions on the Morning Register last Saturday and put out the Sunday morning paper.

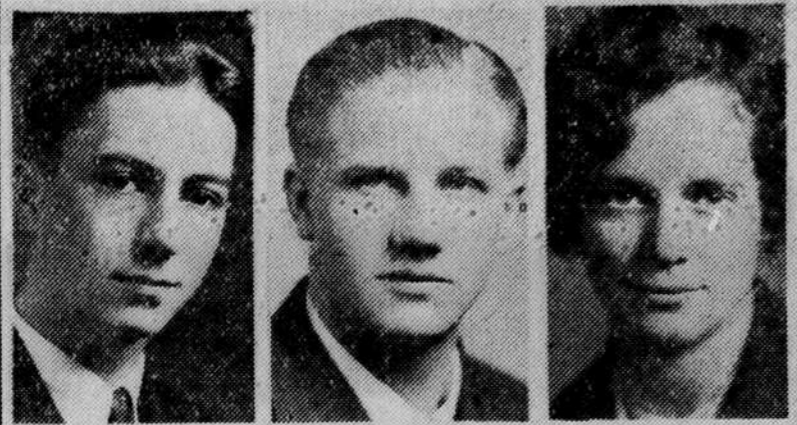
## Tennis Team Meets Oregon State Today

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## Graham H. Stuart Will Visit Oregon Campus Thursday

**Political Scientist to Give Assembly Lecture; Hall Commends Work**

Graham H. Stuart, well-known political scientist and student of international affairs, will visit the University of Oregon campus on May 9 to speak at the student assembly and before the International Relations club, it was announced yesterday.

The coming visit of Professor Stuart, now professor of political science at Stanford university, brought the following statement from Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University of Oregon: "Professor Stuart and I were colleagues for several years at the University of Wisconsin, where he was considered one of the three or four most popular instructors on the campus and was always in great demand before popular as well as technical bodies. He has become a speaker of recognized authority upon problems of world politics and is the outstanding scholar in America in the field of French diplomatic history."

"Gifted with a magnetic person-

ality and fine imagination and clear insight into the forces that condition the development of world affairs, and what he has to say is not only of great interest, but of genuine significance. I am particularly grateful that the International Relations club has been able to secure his services, and I hope that the student body will realize the opportunity that is afforded them to hear an assembly speaker who is a recognized authority and an effective speaker."
